SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC FOR SALEM PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

City Superintendent Authorized to Add an Additional Teacher to the Corps in the East School.

At an adjourned meeting of the board of school directors, held at the high school building last evening, Miss Minnetta Magers, teacher of voice in this city, was elected to the position of supervisor of vocal music in the Salem public schools. Miss Magers will take charge at once, and during the present year will devote her attention exclusively to the grades below the high school. Her chief work will be that of instructing the teachers of the Salem schools in the new course adopted by the state. Miss Magers possesses special qualifications for the duties of this position. She has had a number of years' successful experience as a grade teacher in the public schools of Salem, and showed special aptitude in teaching music. In 1905-1906, while teaching in Salem, she conducted successfully the music work in several rooms of the Park school, and the last half of the year she instructed a class of Salem teachers in school music. In the following year she pursued a public school course for music supervisors in the Chicago Musical College. She also completed a course at the Summer Normal Educational Music School, which is directed by Miss Ada Fleming, one of the most successful supervisors of public school music in this country. In the latter school Miss Magers was given special instruction in the teaching of the New Educational Music Course, which is the system adopted for this state for the next six years.

One additional teacher was added to the East school at the beginning of this year, but it was found that the increase in attendance over that of last year was so great that the employment of another teacher was necessary. Superintendent Powers was instructed to procure a suitable teacher at the earliest opportunity.

Willamette Presbytery.

The Presbytery of Willamette met Tuesday evening in the First Presbyterian church, and was opened with a sermon by the retiring moderator, Rev. George Gillespie, of Mill City, on the text I Cor. xiv:8. "For if the trumpet give an uncertain sound, who shall prepare himself to the battle?" Presbytery was organized with Rev. H. T. Babcock, pastor of the local church, as moderator, and T. B. Griswold, of Albany, as temporary clerk, and H. N. Mount, of Eugene, as reporting clerk.

Letters of dismission were granted to the Rev. L. M. Anderson, to unite with the Southern Oregon Presbytery, and to Rev. Lawson Green to the Presbytery of Utah. Letters of dismission to this Presbytery were received from the Presbytery of New Albany and the Presbytery of Crawfordville, commending the Rev. F. R. Jugg and the Rev. Henry L. Nau, D. D., respectively. The courtesies of the floor were accorded to Revs. J. E. Blair, Thomas Robinson and G. E. Bicknell.

The business sessions today have been occupied with reports of standing committees from the various churches composing the Presbytery. This evening there will be a popular meeting in the interest of the Home and Foreign Mission Boards of the church. Addresses will be delivered by the Rev. Dwight E. Potter, D. D., the western secretary for the Foreign Board, and Mr. Joseph Mc Afee, associate secretary for the Home Board. The Presbytery, through its moderator, extends a very urgent invitation to all members of the local church, their friends and the general public.

ANOTHER TEACHER REQUIRED.

School Board Will Employ Additional Instructor in East School.

The regular meeting of the board of directors for the Salem school district was held last evening. Among the most important actions taken was the authorizing of an additional teacher for the East school, in order to take care of the extra number of students registered this year. The appointment of this teacher was left to City Superintendent Powers. The board elected Miss Minnetta Magers instructor in music in the grades. She will begin her work immediately. Superintendent Powers reported the collection of \$550 for tuition for the first half of the high school term. This amount is much larger than the amount collected for the corresponding term last season. The prospects for the Salem school this year are very encouraging, being probably the brightest in the history of the city, which goes to show the general thrift and growth of the community.

A White Elephant.

Boise, Idaho, Oct. 9.—Attorneys of the state and defense in the Pettibone case are in conference today trying to agree upon a course acceptable to both sides. The defense has been unwilling up to this time to agree to a postponement of the trial set for next Tuesday, unless bail is granted the prisoner, who remains a patient in the hospital, clearly in no physical condition to stand the ordeal of facing a jury. If the case were begun Tuesday it would surely be interrupted by the prisoner's illness, an operation being possible at any time he chooses to go upon the table.

The state is unwilling to have the trial proceed under the circumstances, and is also unwilling to let Pettibone go on bail.
