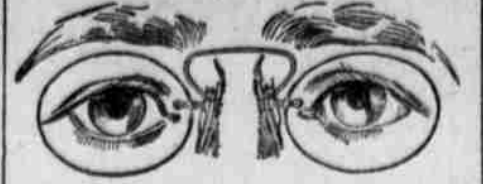
Tony Noltner Dead—
