

MAY DO TIME IN THE PEN

Deaf Mute Speaks Up When He
Wanted Tobacco

Wylie Moores, as complainant, this morning swore out a warrant for the arrest of L. S. Hale, the pretended deaf mute, on a charge of obtaining money and goods under false pretenses. Hale was arrested on the streets last Saturday evening by the city officers for vagrancy, and has since been detained in the city jail. The city has been infested of late by several of these beggars, who stop people on the street, and by deceptive statements as to their physical conditions obtain, through sympathy, small sums of money, and as a warning to such vagabonds, Recorder Moores has decided to make an example of Hale.

Hale arrived in the city recently from Southern Oregon, probably as a knight of the road generally travels, and represented on the streets that he was a deaf mute, in order to receive sympathy and help from passersby. On Sunday afternoon he accosted a Salem man at three different times. In the first and second meetings Hale represented that he was a deaf mute, and solicited help. When the Salem man met him the third time, the "mute" asked for some tobacco.

The penalty for obtaining, or attempting to obtain money or goods under false pretense is from one to five years in the penitentiary.

MITCHELL TO QUIT MINERS

Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 10.—It is announced here today that the next issue of the Mine Worker's Journal will contain the official statement that John Mitchell will not be a candidate for re-election of the United Mine Workers. He will retire from the organization entirely.

Vice-President T. L. Lewis is a candidate to succeed Mitchell. Mitchell and Lewis differ on the treatment of labor troubles, and it is predicted that if Lewis is elected he will advocate a great coal strike. Lewis counseled a strike during the last two conferences between the men and operators. Mitchell says ill-health is the cause of his action.

THE JURY SAYS NOT GUILTY

Pendleton, Oct. 10.—The jury in the case of James Sawyer, charged with killing Jack Monee, after a long discussion, agreed on a verdict of "guilty of manslaughter." Sawyer killed Monee in a drunken row, and the jury took the defendant's mental condition into consideration in arriving at a verdict.

PETTIBONE MAY NEVER BE TRIED

Boise, Oct. 10.—Judge Wood will make a personal investigation of the physical condition of George Pettibone tomorrow, and if he decides that Pettibone is not in condition to stand trial will continue the case on his own motion. Clarence Darrow stated this morning that Pettibone is ready for trial.

GIVEN A NEW TRIAL

Olympia, Wash., Oct. 10.—The supreme court today granted a new trial to Josephine Baruth, sentenced in Spokane county to ten years' imprisonment and \$100 fine, for killing her husband at Medical Lake.

SHINGLE MILLS TO SHUT DOWN

Vancouver, B. C., Oct. 10.—Shingle mills on the coast will close down the first of next month, to stay closed until January 1st. Business depression has caused the shut-down.

Pocatello Man Says Brown Hoped to Catch Simpkins.

Pocatello, Idaho, Oct. 10.—The statement is made here by a man who claims to have been intimate with Harvey Brown during his campaign for governor, that the ex-sheriff employed a spy in the Bourne Miners' Union, who regularly reported the doings of that organization to his principal. The Pocatello man says Brown always believed Jack Simpkins was in hiding somewhere among the mining camps of Eastern Oregon, and lived in hopes of eventually landing him, and securing the large reward offered by the state of Idaho.

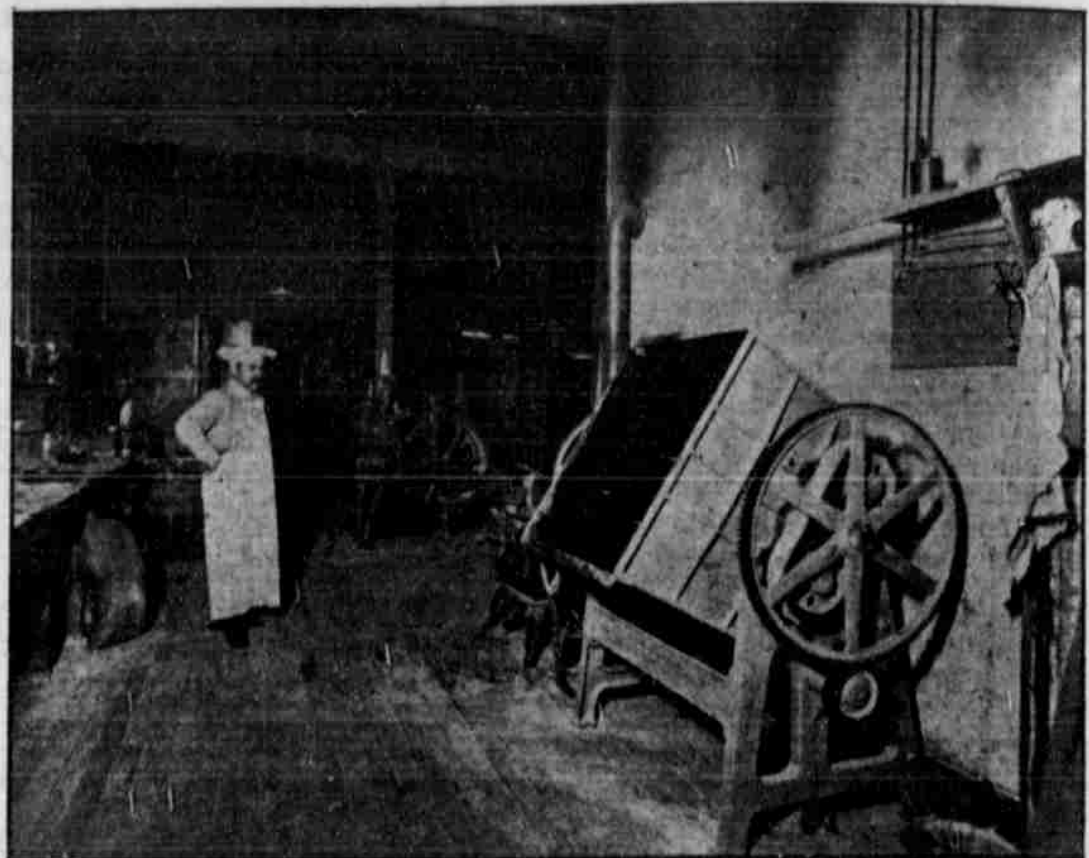
