AMERICA THE LAND OF CONTRACTS

(By Dr. Theodore Barth.)

One idea forced itself upon me when I first journeyed about this country; the same idea persists in obtruding itself now that I return after an interval of ten years. Wherever I turn I see irreconcilable contradictions, remarkable conjunctions, are bound by no spiritual tie, least of all a logical one. This lack of system of the whole American cultural development is the chief cause that even sharp sighted observers so often misjudge the American union. Generalizations are never more dangerous than in critiquing the American characteristics and conditions. It is true that a strong materialistic strain pervades the whole commercial life of the country; superficial observers often have represented the Yankee as a nation for whom the chase of the dollar has assumed the same importance as the chase of the buffalo did for the Indians, the former inhabitants of the country. Those same observers saw in the state and still more in the municipal politics only corruption and graft. Such things do occur and are by no means rare. But beside the race for money and the political corruption there has developed an idealism in public and social service which safely can challenge comparison with the most highly cultivated states of the old world. Such contradictory currents are characteristics of the morals of this country also.

No people is so rich in inventions for rapidity of traffic as the American, yet he suffers with patience in the busiest streets holes in the pavements that are a constant menace to the life and limb of men and horses. Wall street, a typical artery of the materialistic world, ends at Broadway in the graveyard of Trinity church! But the hundreds of thousands who daily crowd the pavement between this cemetery and Wall street never notice the contrast which strikes a stranger at first glance. This is comprehensible only if we realize that this callousness to contrasts is related closely to the most pronounced desire for the superlative.

The highest building in the world, the quickest horse, the dearest picture, the most costly jewels, the largest library, and the richest man in the world as a neighbor are the pride of the average American. But there is a charm for him also in having suffered the most disastrous earthquake, to have seen the most devastating conflagration, or to be able to boast of some other event which, unpleasant as it may have been, yet satisfied his desire of the superlative. I remember that a citizen once showed me the city hall in his town whose architectural charms chiefly were noticeable by their absence, and proudly related that more money had been stolen during its construction than in any city hall in the world.

The confidence in the future of the country is an unmeasured one and this boundless optimism awakes a boundless spirit of adventure. It is evident that this development cannot last forever; out of this lack of system the gravest administrative, social, and political problems must arise. More and more it becomes plain to reflective nature that in no distant future the naturalistic development of the great republic will be halted by all the difficult problems of the modern civic communities in their acutest forms. Meanwhile "times are prosperous," and the great mass of the people is borrowing no trouble.

The American's motto is: "Give me the luxuries of life and I will not ask for the necessities." He will bear present deprivations if he thinks that in the future he will be able to buy his wife's jewels; and all his life he will feel convinced that some day he will be lucky enough to be able to do it. Every man aspires to something better than his present lot, which is the main reason why there is no social democracy in the European sense of the word.

An American workman does not consider himself a member of the proletariat, not a member of a class, who is compelled to remain a wage earner because of the economic

structure of our capitalistic modern world. He joins unions because he follows the lead of capitalistic combinations; he wants to sell his labor at the highest price. But he does not intend to remain a laborer any longer than he has to, therefore there is no real feeling of class versus mass.

This land of contrasts could just as well be called a labyrinth of contrasts. But who will give us the psychologic Ariadne's thread? Above all things it is necessary to avoid superficial generalizations. This land of contrasts is at the same time a land of individualism. Rules are broken so often by exceptions that it always is doubtful which is rule and which exception.

A Far-reaching Guarantee.

Consul Bardel of Bamberg furnishes a report which will interest the general public as well as dealers in watches. He writes:

In Germany, where the government controls the railroads, the postoffice, with mail, express, telegraph and telephone service, and other public utilities, the frequent shifting of the government officers from one place to another has caused the formation of a new organization.

Under the title of "Garantie-Gemeinschaft Deutscher Uhrmacher" (Guarantee Alliance of German Watch-makers) a company has been formed which extends already to 230 German cities, with Leipzig as headquarters. The purpose of this association is to assume co-operative responsibility toward the purchasers of watches sold under a guarantee if, during the time of the guarantee, the purchaser should change his place of residence. In such case the purchaser need not mail or express his watch to the original seller if it gets out of order, but he can select in his new abode any watchmaker who is a member of the organization and demand of him a fulfillment of the guarantee given at the time the purchase was made without any expense to the buyer. The members of this organization are distinguishable by show cards hung up in their store windows. Only reliable houses can be admitted to the association, a fact which commends its members to the confidence of the public.
