Adventures of a Lord.

One of the most amazing careers on record has just been closed by the death of Lord Dunmore. He has been described as an explorer and a faddist, and was famous as an advocate of Christian Science. No one can gainsay his daring and pluck. As a traveler, Lord Dunmore explored "the roof of the world" in the Pamirs and Western Tibet, sleeping amid ice and snow at an altitude 2000 feet higher than Mont Blanc, being ultimately arrested as a Russian spy. At one time he wanted to ride from New York to Paris by land, crossing the Behring straits on the frozen ice, but this he never achieved.

He was one of the first to really explore Newfoundland, and went farther into the "great lone land" than any other white man before it became opened up to civilization. Dunmore Junction on the Canadian Pacific railway, is named after him. At Moose Jaw he mended the wheel of his red river cart with the jawbone of a moose he had shot, and the Indian scouts called it the place where "the one-eyed white chief"—a shooting accident having deprived him of the use of one of his eyes—"mended his cart with the jawbone of a moose," shortened eventually into "Moose Jaw."

Viscount Fincastle, who succeeds to the title, is no less daring than his father. He won the V. C. in the Afghan Frontier War of 1897, and commanded Fincastle's Horse in the South African campaign, winning a medal and four clasps.

CIRCUIT COURT DOCKET

Cases Set For Trial For the Next Week

At an adjourned session of department No. 1 of the Marion county circuit court this week, Judge Burnett set the following cases:

Monday afternoon, October 14—State of Oregon vs. T. J. Luper, on a charge of perjury in the Luper divorce proceedings.

Tuesday, October 15, 9 a. m.—State of Oregon vs. Henry Carmody, for selling liquor without a license; also the case of the state vs. Jack Riddell at 1 p. m.

This is a suit in which Jack Riddell is accused by the grand jury of the crime of assault with a dangerous weapon, in assaulting J. P. Meehan with a revolver on the 14th of April, 1907.

John H. McNary will conduct the prosecution.

Wednesday, October 16, 9 a. m.—August Kerberger vs. School District No. 24. This is the civil suit in which the plaintiff claims \$340 as damages and costs of materials used in the construction of cement floors in the basement of the North school. Kerberger claims that he submitted a bid for \$567.75 for the work which bid was accepted by the school board, and when he had the work partially completed the board would not permit him to finish nor would it allow him any money for the labor already performed, claiming that the work was defective. In the reply the board deny that the contract was ever let to Mr. Kerberger and claim that a notice was given him to discontinue work which notice he disregarded. The work was then let to Keenen for \$609.65. Carson & Cannon are attorneys for the defense.

Thursday, October 17, 9 a. m.—State of Oregon vs. Clark; also Worden vs. Culver, and the case of E. C. Knipper vs. D. W. Fisher, in the afternoon. The latter suit is to obtain possession of a donkey engine valued in the complaint at \$900 and \$1000 damages is also asked.

Friday, October 18, 9 a. m.—State of Oregon vs. Bartoz.

Saturday—U. S. Rider vs. Benjamin; suit for damage for killing dog.
