At a meeting held at the First Methodist church in Salem on Sunday next, the trustees of the University of Oregon, by unanimous vote, decided to begin immediately a campaign to secure for the University a new endowment of \$100,000.
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David H. Moore is prominently interested in the immediate success of this campaign. He has \$500 and has promised to devote the whole month of October to securing the \$100,000.

A wealthy man has offered that one of the best of endowment would be a block of land in the University of Oregon, which should be sold for the purpose of endowment. President Moore says:
"It is self-evident that if anyone in the University will make a substantial effort, this campaign will be quickly crowned with glory. If everyone will contribute, what will then be the result? Then sincerely follow the path which seems wise and right and the goal will be accomplished. We know full well that this is the way of almost unequalled importance."

Gift of \$50,000.
A. Eaton of Union, owner of the woolen mills, and one of the wealthiest men in Union county, has authorized the statement that he has made an absolute gift to the University of Salem, of \$50,000, the money to be used in the building of buildings and in the support of higher education. Mr. Eaton announces further that he will give more money for endowment purposes after the building is completed.
Part of Eighty Thousand.

Portland. This \$80,000 was subscribed by a number of persons, in amounts from \$10,000 down, and all made conditional upon the endowment fund being increased \$100,000.

That this condition will be met, there can now be no doubt. It will be more than met, no doubt, by the subscriptions at the First Methodist church in Salem on Sunday next.

The fact is, the present movement is to raise \$250,000 endowment, besides enough money to construct at least one or more large buildings on the campus, and if possible two more.

That the whole \$250,000 will be raised for endowment, there is little doubt, on the part of those who are familiar with the workings of the university. A number of wealthy men who are considering the matter of giving have not yet made up their minds. For various other reasons, some large sums that are certain are not yet ready to be announced.

The endowment fund is now about \$35,000, but this, it is understood, is not to be considered in the matter of raising the \$100,000, or increasing it to \$250,000. If the latter effort is successful, the total endowment of the institution, and its colleges, will be about \$285,000.

It is likely that Mr. Eaton expects that his \$50,000 will be used in the erection of a building.

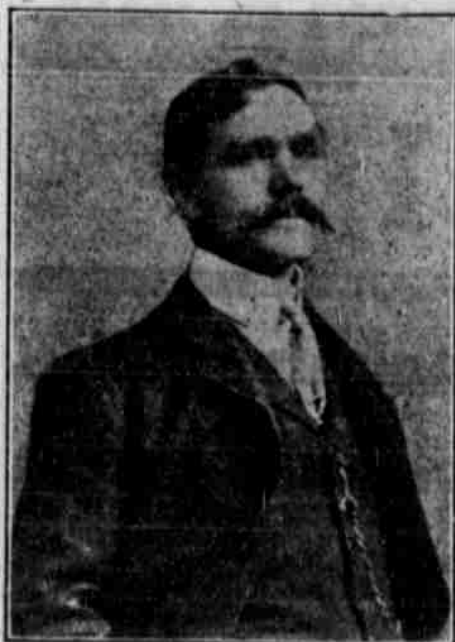

Salem Union Carpenters to Entertain Their Fellow Craftsman

Invitations are out for a social gathering at Union hall, No. 416, State street, Saturday evening, October 12, at 7:30, given by the members of carpenters' union of this city, a strong and popular labor organization. There will be a musical and literary program, with speaking and refreshments, and for the general welfare of that organization. The carpenters' union has a splendid membership and has exerted a good influence in promoting the interest and welfare of its members and in making Salem a better town for the

laboring class. All carpenters, whether members of the union or not, and their ladies are invited to be present and enjoy themselves Saturday evening.

Salem Carpenters Union, No. 1065.

This union of the United Brothers of Carpenters and Joiners of America has existed in Salem for many years, and has at present a membership of about 60. The officers are George S. Welch, 1053 Sixteenth street, president; Wm. Pettit is financial secretary, and A. W. Dennis, recording secretary. President Welch is one of a family of carpenters, having located at Salem in 1882, and being one of seven brothers, all workers, six of whom are carpenters, and all but one living in Oregon. President Welch is not a believer in strikes. He says he always thought there was a way to avoid strikes, and he does not believe in causing anyone any trouble but himself. The Salem union has been able to get an eight-hour day and increased wages without resorting to strikes. It is not so long ago that good men worked ten hours a day for \$1.50 to \$2, and now they are getting \$3 to \$3.50.

The Oldest Union.

Salem is not as strong a town as some others in Oregon in unions. At times the only labor organization in the Capital City has been the printers. Capital Typographical union with a membership that varies from 30 to 60, has had the longest continual existence of any of these organizations, and from the standpoint of intelligence and efficiency has been a powerful organization at all times. The principle of giving the employer some consideration has ever entered into the deliberations of the types, and so strikes have been few and of late years not readily resorted to. For a year or more the job printers of the city have been in the union, and the printing craft was never so strongly unionized as at present. Upon removal of Wm. Baker from this city the duties of president have devolved upon L. R. Stinson, vice president. Other officers are: Elmo S. White, financial secretary; Henry Pape, recording secretary; Sam Vail, sergeant at arms.

Other Union Workers.

There are in Salem about 50 employees who are connected with Portland unions, as for instance the brewery and bottling workers, pressmen in several of the printing offices of the city, and members of the cigar makers union, all affiliated at Portland. These workers find it cheaper to hold cards in the Portland organizations than to carry on local unions. Under modern systems of working labor organizations they can have all the protection afforded by a local union without the trouble or expense of attending meetings. They are an effective working force in the cause of unionism.

John R. Walsh to Be Tried.

Chicago, Oct. 12.—John R. Walsh former president of the wrecked Chicago National Bank, must stand trial next week on 175 counts of the indictments against him, charging misapplication of funds and credits of the institution, and also that he made false entries in the reports to the comptroller of the currency between 50 and 60 transactions are covered in the indictment, the aggregate sum involved being about \$3,500,000. The minimum sentence for conviction on a single count is five years. Such a verdict, if given, would virtually be one of death for the aged and broken financier, who is now in his 70th year.

The specific charges are that sums of money were credited to the Personal account of President Walsh, as the result of "memorandum note" transactions, and of the sale of certain bonds to the bank; and that payments of money were made by him from the sums of money credited to his account following the transactions in "memorandum notes" and the sale of bonds. The Chicago Chronicle, the newspaper which represented the Walsh regime when the Irish financier was dreaming dreams of railway empire, and which collapsed when the Walsh bubble burst, is named in three counts as having received \$60,000 of the millions secured through the alleged discounting of fraudulent and insecure paper. It is alleged that other large sums went to bolster the Walsh railroad properties, the Illinois Southern, the Southern Indiana and the Wisconsin & Michigan.

According to the indictment, the misappropriation of the funds was made without the knowledge or disapproval of the directors or officials. Walsh is said to have been animated in his wrong-doing by the desire to satisfy his ambition to become a railroad king.

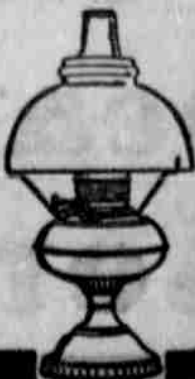

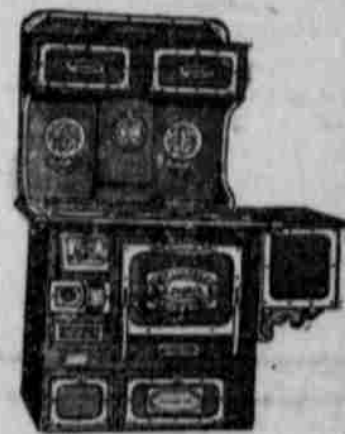
