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OPENING OF THE FOOTBALL SEASON

Schedules of Willamette and U. of O. With Brief Outline of the Makeup of the Teams and Salem's High School Team

There has been a great deal of talk about Willamette's not going to have a good football team this year, but in the past week the prospects have been brightened up wonderfully. About 30 men are out now every night and they are rounding up rapidly into excellent shape and give promise of making a pretty fast bunch.

Willamette has a regular coach this year, C. F. Chase, a Michigan university football man, who is to be given much credit for the team he is working up. At the first of the season Chase could hardly get eleven men out to practice and it looked pretty bad to him, but now with his large squad out he says that prospects look bright. There are only three veterans of last year's team back in the squad, Al Nace, who played half-back last year is captaining the team this season and playing his old position. Nace did some great playing last year as will be remembered by anyone who saw the Willamette games. Nelson, the

High School Team.
From the way things are going at present it looks as if the high school was going to put out a record-breaking football team this season. There are seven of last year's team back, and plenty of new candidates, making up a large squad of about 25 out every evening. A second team has been organized, which gives a chance for plenty of bucking practice. The Willamette grounds have been secured, the team practicing every night on the upper field.

Chauncey Bishop has taken up the job of coach, and is rounding up a team that is going to put up a hot fight for the high school championship. Bishop is recognized as one of the best coaches in the Northwest, and is teaching the boys many new stunts and plays, that are sure new stunts and plays, that are sure

On Thursday and Friday nights the high school team had a couple of 20-minute scrimmage practices with the Willamette first team, and surprised everyone in the way they held the big team down, even getting a touchdown on Friday night, when Keene, playing right tackle, broke through, and, picking up a fumble, ran half the length of the field for a touchdown. Later Willamette scored a touchdown over the high school. In Thursday night's scrimmage the high school made a touchdown, while W. U. made a goal on a place kick.

"Dolly" Farmer is captaining the high school team this year and playing quarterback. Farmer is playing even better than last year. Perry Jones, last year's captain, is playing right half this year, and Smith, an end, is out for fullback, while Royal

But center is back again and also Hewitt, who is filling his old position at guard. As to the new men, it would be hard to say much until after their first game and they have a chance to show what is in them in the football line. The varsity team has had a couple of practice scrimmages with the high school team in which they showed up well although not finding the high school as easy as they had probably expected.

The Willamette field is being improved by enclosing the playing field with a five-foot woven wire fence ten feet from the playing line. This will be a great improvement; for heretofore it has been impossible to keep the crowds back from the playing line during an exciting game, many times interfering with end plays.

Coach Chase has been putting the team through secret practices all week and expects to win a large number of the games that are scheduled with the coast universities.

Willamette opens her season here next Monday in a game against the University of Washington team which is said to be very strong this year. The University of Washington plays Multnomah today which will give a line as to their strength and what to expect when they play here Monday. There will undoubtedly be a large crowd out to see this game and do some rooting for Willamette.

Niles, who played half, is after an end position this year, also Kay is out for his old place at end. Keene, last year's fast center, will probably play right tackle, while Hofer, who played left guard, is trying again for the same place. Richardson and Savage, two of the old Willamette Junior's swift team, are in the high school now, and will strengthen the team.

Above is the complete list of games which will be played by the University of Oregon team during the coming season. Only two games, one with Pacific university and one with O. A. C. will be played in Eugene.

As a whole the schedule is the same as it was when first made out by Manager Kestly last spring. The date, November 23, was left open in order to give the Washington State college eleven an opportunity to try conclusions with the U. of O. squad, if the two teams should prove to be close contestants for north-west championship honors. Since the University of Washington and Washington State college have buried the hatchet, such a game will be impossible as the two latter teams lock horns at Pullman, Washington, on November 21.

The strength of Oregon's team is as yet unknown. There are at present in the neighborhood of 35 men trying out for positions on the 'varsity'. At center, Ferris Ray and Hildeburn are doing consistent work. The material at the guard and tackle position is unusually good. Of last year's men, the veteran Arnsperger, Scott, Pinkham, McIntire, Voigt, Grout and Kilpatrick remain. All are big men and capable of the responsibility of holding a position on the 'varsity'.

Material for the back and end positions is not as plentiful as in previous years. Kuykendall at quarter is one of the fastest men in the game, but is without a substitute since Billy Wood's injury. Moore, the midget quarter from Drain normal is small for a 'varsity' man, though he has splendid nerve. Harvey Huston was quarter on the freshman team at Berkeley, and should he try for that position here, will be a valuable addition to the squad.

Zacharias, Clarke, Taylor and Obertauer are being tried out for the half-back positions. It is unknown which two of these men will be chosen for the team as Coach Frost says the eleven will not be picked until they line up for the final game of the season. "Mike" Walker is showing up well at full. Walter McIntyre will also make a strong bid for this position.

For the end positions the candidates are Captain Moore, Coleman, Erskine, Dodson and Halley. Moores is under weight this year and is playing in unusually poor form. The other candidates are all playing consistently and have the earmarks of 'varsity' men.

Coach Frost is reticent and his opinion as to Oregon's chances is unknown. He is delighted with the large squad which is turning out, likes the men and their spirit and will undoubtedly turn out a team which will be a credit to the university. —Oregon Weekly.
