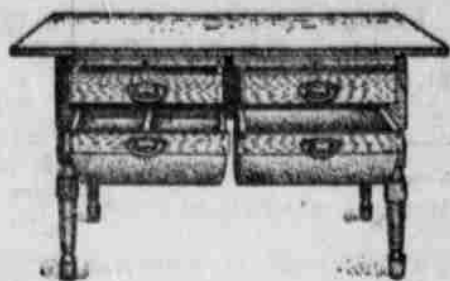

NO RACE SUICIDE HERE.

Oregon Reports 613 Births and 323 Deaths for August.

If President Roosevelt came to Oregon to live he would find, according to the August report of the state board of health, that race suicide is not occurring, for there were 436 marriages in the month, 613 births and only 323 deaths.

Of the infectious diseases tuberculosis claims 25; typhoid fever, 11; diphtheria, 1; measles, 3; other diseases, 3; only 43 deaths for the month from diseases of this class. The report tells of the bubonic plague in San Francisco and of the fight made against the spread of the disease, in which is expressed the belief that there is no danger of the plague reaching any of the Oregon cities. In regard to infectious diseases the board lays particular emphasis upon the use of towels in the school rooms, urging individual articles for the students to prevent possible contagion.

After stating the symptoms of common infectious diseases the report has the following to say about cerebro-spinal meningitis, and the use of towels in the school rooms:

"While the exact method of the spread of this disease is not known, it is believed that the organism which causes cerebro-spinal meningitis is in the secretions of the nose, and that the nasal secretions are responsible more than anything else for the spread of the disease. It is thought that the micro-organism will reside in the secretions of some individual and produce no disturbance further than local nasal discharge, owing to the fact that the individual is not susceptible, or else that the micro-organism has not gained entrance to the meninges, while these same discharges will produce meningitis in a susceptible person.

"Above are the common ordinary diseases that could be transmitted through the use of a common towel, and the board believes that it would be far better for the scholar to have a towel all than to be supplied with a towel in common. The proper way to do is for each child to have its own towel, and be compelled to use it to the exclusion of all others, just as each child should have its own pencil, books, tablets and other paraphernalia that are at times used in common.

Bodies Petrified.

A dispatch from Chicago Saturday says:

Workmen who today removed 12 bodies of nuns from the lot in the rear of the academy of the Ladies of the Sacred Heart found that two of the number those of Mother Galway, founder of the institution, and Mother Gauthreaux, her successor, were petrified. Both practically were intact, even to the robes in which they were buried, while only the bones of the other ten were found.

Eight men exerted all of their strength to remove the metallic casket containing the body of Mother Galway, and its estimated weight was 1100 pounds. The body of Mother Gauthreaux which also was in a metal coffin, was removed from the casket as the latter had been cracked and disintegrated by the frost.

Mother Gauthreaux died in 1867 and her predecessor in office died four years later. Both were prepared for burial and placed in the casket by the nuns at the institution and it is believed that the coverings were not properly fastened. This admitted the water, which is presumed to have caused petrification.

Newspaper Don'ts.

Miss Susan Glaspell of Davenport, Iowa, recently read before the club women of her city a paper on the relations between the editor and his occasional contributor. In the article were some valuable "don'ts" that will meet the approbation of every newspaper man. They are as follows:

Don't come to the newspaper office Thursday with something that happened Monday. Come on Monday.

Don't come at two minutes of 3 o'clock when the paper goes to press at two minutes after. The assassination of the President of the United States would be presented at that hour.

Don't ask a reporter to run a column of reprint stuff which may serve your cause, but has practically no news value, and then when you have a good live story give to the other paper. The reporter will not like that a bit.

Don't go to the managing editor and ask that a legitimate news story be kept out. It would be just as unreasonable and just as indelicate as to go to the banker and ask him to give you money or to the lawyer and ask him to give up one of his cases. A newspaper is a business enterprise. When you ask it to keep out news, you ask it to injure its own business.

Don't blame the reporter if something you gave him or her does not appear. It is not the reporter's fault. The city editor is the court of last appeal, and he works on the principal of the survival of the fittest. The fact that your committee is going to do something may be very important to you, but the fact that some girl drank carbolic acid is more important to the city editor.

Don't say, "I can't understand why the papers make so many mistakes." If you had ever been in the business you would say instead, "I think it one of the miracles of the age that newspapers can do that amount of work under that amount of pressure and make so few mistakes."
