More Interest in Nervous People.

It is fortunate for our people that practicing physicians are becoming ever more interested in nervous people and that they are learning to recognize more fully than formerly the importance of the psychic side of their cases. The deficiency in this respect has been due in part, first, to lack of instruction regarding the healthy mind (psychology), and secondly, to lack of instruction regarding the sick mind (psychiatry). American universities are far behind those of the rest of the world in their provision for instruction in the latter subject. In Italy and Germany especially every university hospital has its psychiatric clinic in which its professor of psychiatry teaches students how to recognize and treat mental phenomena which deviate from the normal. While America has made admirable provision for the care and comfort of the insane, American medical schools are lamentably lacking in facilities for teaching medical students psychiatry, and especially for giving instruction in diagnosis and treatment in that wide and indefinite borderland between mental health and mental disease. Dr. Lewellys F. Barker.

Breaking Liquor Laws.

The breaking of the liquor law of Maine is notorious. It has developed among the people a disregard for law, which gives the best citizens of the state anxious concern, says the Outlook. The attempt to enforce prohibition in many cities of Maine has been almost continuously resisted. Similar conditions prevail in cities of Kansas. Kansas City, Kas., has been boasting of its enforcement of the liquor law—practically a modification of local option for a prohibition state. Iowa tried prohibition, then passed a law to provide for its violation. If the experience of Georgia differs, the law and the conditions under which it operates will invite study.

Committees Appointed and Will Canvass the City Nov. 5 and 6

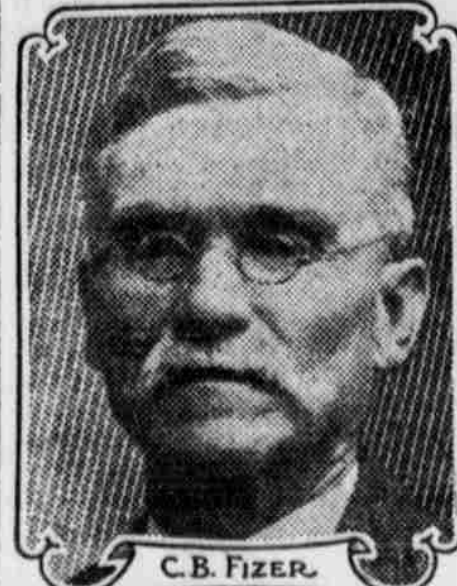

Nobody will be bored and ding-donged, but everybody will be given the opportunity to do the handsome thing, and everyone who is looking into the matter must be fully convinced that this contribution from Salem will be one of the best investments of capital that could be possibly made. The return on the investment is sure and perpetual, and the only question with subscribers to this fund will be not how little, but how much can be put into a worthy enterprise.
