Order to Vote At the Primary November 2nd., Citizens Must Register At the City Hall

Up to last night only about 75 voters had registered for the primary to be held in advance of the city election, November 2.

The books are open at the city hall for each ward, and to vote at the next nominating primary (Republican and Democrats must be registered).

There will be one alderman to be chosen in each ward of the city. Under the new charter to be adopted, the aldermen will not take office, and seven holdover aldermen will be the city council next year.

The charter is not adopted by the people, the new aldermen with seven holdovers will be the city council next year.

The proposed city charter is not printed. The proofs are at the city attorney's office, or at the first eight pages, and the city attorney, Burghard & Co., say the proofs will be ready for delivery on time.

In the meantime citizens and taxpayers should register and begin to look out men to run for aldermen in each ward.

### Smoothing Dusty Roads in Saxony.

Colonel T. H. Norton, writing from Chemnitz, says that a Saxon has introduced a new road-smoothing composition called "Apothek" which has been tried on the main roads of Leipzig and

other places with much success. The material is thus described:

It is a mixture of the heavier residual oils obtained in the distillation of coal tar with high boiling hydrocarbons. The method of mixing apparently involves a certain degree of chemical combination, in which phenol and similar constituents play a role. The manufactured material is prepared for use by heating in iron caldrons, identical with those used for asphalt, to temperatures ranging from 212 to 248 degrees F. (100 to 120 degrees C.). It is then sprayed evenly over the surface of the roadway with a special form of apparatus, and under such high pressure that the fluid mass penetrates to a certain distance into the upper layer of dust or dirt. The result is the formation of a compact, lustrous black coating, which meets the demands of heavy traffic and is not disintegrated into dust particles. A marked advantage of the new process over the methods hitherto employed for the same purpose, and based upon the use of ordinary tar, is the total absence of odor after the application.

**Surnames Not Used by Kings.**  
The origin of most royal houses was similar throughout Europe, and kings and their families, speaking broadly, never had or used surnames. They signed their Christian names alone.

So universally was this the case that it became rigid etiquette that a person of royal birth should not use a surname, though there have been numbers of cases of dynasties, like the Stuarts, like the Bernadotte dynasty of Sweden or like the Bonaparte family, who unquestionably and indubitably had inherited surnames. But it has always been a puzzle why the cadet members of our own royal house do not subscribe themselves as peers by their peerage designations, as do other peers.

However, the fact is they do not, but it has not been discovered what are the rules which govern their signatures. The sovereign signs by the Christian name and usually adds

"R." or "R. and I." Princes and princesses sign by their Christian names, and sometimes, but not always, add the letter "P." When or why this is added or omitted is not known.

But the habits of royalty leads others into strange happenings. There was an occasion upon which Queen Victoria, after a "function," was asked to sign a visitor's book. Her majesty wrote "Victoria R. and I." Princess Henry of Battenberg then wrote "Beatrice P." The turn of the local mayor came next and she signed "Elizabeth." The surname was hastily written in the following day, but too late to prevent the story gaining currency.—T. P.'s Weekly.
