TRUE INTEREST OF THE STATE UNIVERSITY.

The discussion of the real needs of the state university should not be mixed up with a warfare on the initiative and referendum.

If the people of Oregon had to part with either one or the other, they ought to have to vote down the state university **AND KEEP THE REFERENDUM.**

But fortunately no such choice is necessary. In voting against or even calling in question the advisability of increasing the annual appropriation to \$125,000 annually and continually, **WE ARE NOT SEEKING TO ABOLISH OR CRIPPLE THE UNIVERSITY OF OREGON.**

There has been no intelligent attempt to place the interests of the people in the university before the people.

All is passionate and heated argument against taking the referendum, and **TALK ABOUT ENEMIES OF EDUCATION.**

The people should hold up the university appropriation until they can get some assurances that it shall be what its name really signifies and that it shall carry on at the university a law and medical school.

No one blames President Campbell for sustaining the state university tax or even telling how much more other states give to support their state universities.

But he must not blame the people for also asking what other states get for the money they give, and he will not blame the people of Oregon for asking that they **GET A LITTLE MORE FOR WHAT THEY GIVE.**

In other words, the improvement and reformation of the Oregon university cannot come from within, but must be forced upon that institution from the outside.

Just as the normal schools were never able to get upon a solid financial and professional basis with local management, the state university must be given renovating influences **FROM THE GREAT BODY OF INDEPENDENT CITIZENSHIP IN THE STATE AT LARGE.**

President Campbell well says it costs citizens \$1000 to \$1200 per year to send their sons to other colleges and universities in other states. Judging from the experience of other states, if Oregon had a law school and a medical and dental school, 300 more students would be enrolled at Eugene.

That would mean that (according to President Campbell's figures), that three hundred to three hundred and sixty thousand dollars are sent out of the state annually for that education in professional lines **WHICH STUDENTS CANNOT OBTAIN AT THE OREGON STATE UNIVERSITY.**

A man who desires to have his son educated for a lawyer, doctor, or dentist must now send that son to other states if he would have him enjoy the benefits of university culture and associations.

It is said generally that the law and medical schools of Oregon universally have but a small attendance and **ARE NOT STRONG DEPARTMENTS.**

It is a notorious fact that the law and medical student body are the backbone of any university in oratory, athletics and college spirit. They are the brainy, aggressive material of universities.

A plan to put those departments into the Eugene institution should be worked out and let our sons and daughters who wish to enter an university have the same opportunity to study in their home state **THAT STUDENTS OF OTHER STATES HAVE.**

It will be said that Oregon university has those departments now at the city of Portland, and that other universities maintain those departments at some large city away from the university.

That is true but the great universities of the United States have the legal and medical schools at the school itself, and the growing demand of the age is that those professions shall have **MORE OF CULTURE ALONG WITH THEIR PROFESSIONAL EQUIPMENT.**

The university acquaintance and associations is worth a great deal to any young man or woman in a profession.

Let us not be mealy-mouthed about this. Let us have some assurance that the university will be what it should be before we vote it a larger tax merely to be absorbed by the present incomplete institution.

REPAIR THE COUNTY ROADS.

This is the time of the year to look after the condition of the roads for winter.

One load of gravel now used to fill small chuck holes **WILL DO MORE GOOD THAN FIVE LOADS IN THE SPRING.**

For the next month the road supervisors should be asked to go over the more important roads in their district and fix them for winter.

Many a road can be kept from becoming impassable by **LITTLE ATTENTION AT THIS SEASON.**

Crushed rock roads should be looked over and new metalling done where wearing badly.

South Commercial street for a mile should have the waste material from the side of the street, where it has been forced by travel, put up in the center next to the streetcar rails.

PETTIGREW ON ROOSEVELT.

South Dakota ex-Senator Not One of His Admirers.

Washington, Oct. 18.—Former United States Senator R. F. Pettigrew, of South Dakota landed in Washington this week, and in characteristic style paid caustic compliments to the President and his cabinet. He stigmatized Mr. Roosevelt's policy as a "bluff," and declared the members of his cabinet were not men who have been distinguished for their attacks on corporate wrongdoing. He declared that for years Secretary Root was the guide, mentor and friend of big New York corporations; Attorney-General Bonaparte has been the counsel of more than one big corporation of capital; Secretary Taft, an excellent injunction judge; Secretary Cortelyou's friendship for certain special interests in New York are well-known, and Assistant Secretary Bacon was recruited by Mr. Roosevelt directly from the office of J. Pierpont Morgan. Because of all this, Mr. Pettigrew affects to believe that the President's program will be one of bluster more than one productive of results. He believes also, taking the general sentiment of South Dakota as a criterion, that the President will be renominated in 1908, in spite of his avowed determination not to run again.

Bar Foreigners From Japan's Mines.

It will be remembered that a severe discussion took place during the twenty-first session of the diet in connection with article five of the mining regulations, which prohibits any other than a Japanese and juridical persons established under Japanese law from working mines in this country. Several members insisted that the law should be amended in order that foreigners might be allowed to freely work mines in Japan. This liberal view, however, failed to gain general support, a majority of the members opposing it. The Kobe Herald learns that the question has now been raised again, the advocates of progress urging that Japan has undergone considerable change since then and that the time has really arrived for a revision of the law. Many members of the diet now consider that the abolition of the article will greatly facilitate the flotation of Japanese loans abroad. It is believed that another proposal for a revision of the mining regulations will be submitted to the diet in the coming session.—Japan Gazette.
