SATURDAY'S FOOTBALL GAMES

New York, Oct. 18.—Hundreds of New Yorkers will have their first taste of football this season tomorrow, when Yale meets West Point at the military school campus. A great crowd of partisans of both institutions will go up from the metropolis to witness the contest, which promises to be the most interesting yet thus far this season. The Yale squad has developed in good shape and will likely make the Eli's victory.

While the soldiers are contesting with Yale, Harvard will be playing the sailors at Annapolis. Crimson eleven leaves today on invasion of the south, accompanied by a large band of rooters, who are confident that the Cambridge team will roll up an overwhelming victory against Uncle Sam's gallant men. This will be the only game Harvard will play away from home this year.

Of the other games to be played at eastern gridirons tomorrow, that between Philadelphia between Pennsylvania and Brown is the most prominent. Brown is easily among the best in football of the second-year institutions, and if the Quakers win a victory from them they will go to work for it. Princeton is expected to find Washington and Jefferson an "easy mark," and Cornell would have no trouble in piling up scores against Penn. State. The Yale redskins will meet Bucknell at their own scarping grounds, and probably have a lot of new locks adding to their belts tomorrow.

Of the smaller eastern colleges to play tomorrow, Dartmouth will be at Maine, Trinity at Amherst, Williams at Syracuse, George Washington at Swarthmore, Haverford at New York university, Wesleyan at Johns Hopkins at Stevens.

The big game in the west will be at Chicago and Illinois. At the first time since 1897 the teams will play on Illinois field. Interest attaches to the game, as the Illinois should again be crowned, it is likely that graduation system of that institution would be abandoned. The overwhelming defeat of the Illinois at the hands of the Maroons last fall created great dissatisfaction, and would the football history of the last two seasons repeat itself, there is small doubt that a radical change coaching will be made at the University.

Other western games include Missouri at Iowa, Alumni at Indiana and Haskell at Washburn. Important southern games scheduled for tomorrow include Sewanee and Auburn at Birmingham and Georgia Tech vs. Tennessee.

A NOISE LIKE CANNON

Washington, Oct. 18.—There are a number of presidential possibilities in the Republican ranks that are genuinely "armed at the activity" displayed by "Uncle Joe" Cannon's boom. The election of two delegates to the convention of 1908 from the eighth congressional district of Michigan, both of whom are pledged to vote for Speaker Cannon, has started a storm of speculation. It is not known whether the Michigan election is merely a spasm of evidence of Cannon enthusiasm, or whether it is the first sign of a concerted movement which is designed to become widespread. The approach of the opening of the 60th congress places Mr. Cannon in a peculiarly powerful position. There is scarcely any doubt that he will be re-elected speaker of the house, and as such he will have the reconstruction of the various committees. By favoring certain cliques and certain sections "Uncle Joe" will be able to build a congressional machine that will be a power in itself. Although he will not prostitute his position to effect this end, it is certain that the sage of Danville is too good a politician to overlook such an opportunity.

HARTE ROASTS THEATERS

Seattle Minister Says They Must Be Indecent Or Die

Wholesale denunciation of the theater and inability to find in it anything but a degenerating, crime-producing and virtue-wrecking force, formed the principal feature of the address delivered to two thousand persons at the tabernacle Tuesday night by Evangelist Albert C. Harte. From the best that can be found in legitimate drama down to the most sensational melodrama, right through the whole list, they were declared to be a menace to society, a sore and an ulcer that taints and corrodes and corrupts everything that they touch.

"You talk about choosing your plays," he said; "why you might just as well go in the midst of a heap of carrion to find fresh meat. Take your own city. In one-half day 50 divorces were granted and were largely caused by the theater; this is enough to make the angels weep and cause the devil to hold high carnival. The theater is not a moral agency, not an educator, not a refining force, but it is simply after the money."

"Eliminate from the stage all that is vulgar, indecent and inane and every show house will close its doors inside of 30 days. It is a place where everything that is pure and holy is held up to ridicule; where the most sacred things are ruthlessly torn to pieces for the delectation of the laughing, sneering multitude; where religion is scoffed at and where domestic happiness and fidelity are treated with contempt. But the theater must either be indecent or die. It panders to the baser elements in our nature and depends for its very existence on that baseness."—Seattle Times
