DELICATE TRIBUTE

The Late John Paul Jones Made Sutject of Circular Letter By the Company

Generally when a man has given his best for a great corporation, unless indeed he becomes its real head, his death causes but little ripple in that corporation's life.

There is a promotion somewhere a new name takes it place on the pay roll, and except that those who were closely associated with him mention his fine traits or recall some pleasant incident occasionally, he is forgotten. It is on this account that a departure from this rule becomes more noticeable. The Journal notes, and commends the action of General Passenger Agent Murray and others in authority in the Southern Pacific. in officially calling the attention of the agents of the company and its other employes, to the passing of one intimately associated with them. A tribute of this kind is rare indeed, and as unexpected and surprising as a wild flower that finds place to bloom in some protected niche within a busy city.

A few days ago there was issued from the general passenger department of the S. P. at Portland, the following circular letter:

Death of John Paul Jones.

John Paul Jones, traveling passenger agent of the Southern Pacific company (lines in Oregon), died at the Good Samaritan hospital, Portland, Oregon, Saturday morning, October 12, 1907, after a lingering illness of more than five months. He was first taken sick early in May. while accompanying an excursion of Portland Shriners to Los Angeles to attend their annual pilgrimage in that city, and except for occasional periods of short duration, he did not rally afterward.

Mr. Jones was one of the veterans of the railroad service of the northwest. He cameto Oregon from Mishouri in 1881, and soon afterward accepted the position of forage master of the Oregon & California Fifteenth and Mill streets. Sun- railroad, at that time pushing con-In 1887 he was appointed traveling passenger agent, which position he retained until his death.

The peculiar duties of his position made it necessary for him to mingle with people everywhere, at all times and under all circumtances, and a fitting tribute to his long and faithful service was the high regard, confidence and affection of all who knew him. Though mild of manner he was of strong personality, gentle, courteous, and lovable, and the announcement of his death, even though hourly expected, is the occasion for widespread sorrow and regret,

The funeral took place in Salem. under the impressive service of the Knights Templar of that city, of which fraternity he was an honored mother survive him, both residing on his farm near Salem.
