**Fine Horse Drowned**—A valuable riding horse shipped by the Tongue Point Lumber Company, of Astoria, to Charles C. Patrick, of Independence, was drowned at Portland Saturday morning. The horse was shipped on the Lurline to Portland, and was to be transferred to the Oregon, which lay alongside of the wharf for several hours to receive the animal consigned to Salem. The captain of the Oregon saw some man in skiffs trying to rescue a horse that was swimming in the river near the bridge below the boat that answered the description of the horse shipped to Mr. Patrick, who is cashier of the First State

**Bank, of Independence.** Later advices may show that the horse was not the same one reported drowned, but the description tallies pretty closely, and some steamboat company will have a horse to pay for.

**DANNY A GREAT DRAWER**

Has Vivid Imagination and May Develop Into a Corporation Manager

Dannie Downing, the 8-year-old kid who did the "driven from home" and "only three grains of corn" act so successfully Saturday, that he awakened the sympathy of a whole depot full of travelers, caused women's bright eyes to dim with tears, the police force to get busy, and even the newspaper reporters to do some adjectival stunts, is out of the lime light, temporarily. Dannie is a bright little boy with a remarkably vivid imagination, which, if properly cultivated, will put him in the Jules Verne class. He will probably develop into a modern novelist, a yellow journal reporter, a street preacher, or a politician, and, with proper opportunity, may possibly become a first-class prevaricator, and join the Pinkertons or get an office in Idaho. Dannie told a pitiful story of having been driven from home because he had lost five pennies, and that he had nothing to eat, but was abused by his stepmother, and a lot of other stuff that was, on the face of it, untrue, and that a little investigation would have so proved. As a matter of fact, Dannie was adopted by Mr. and Mrs. Henry Downing when he was but seven or eight months old. The Downings are industrious, respectable people, both past middle life, and have treated the boy as their own. They say the boy has a penchant for running away, and that his story is made of whole cloth. He has no sister in Portland, the lady he referred to as being his sister being Mrs. Downing's daughter. He was taken home yesterday, and was evidently glad to get there.

**REVIVAL INTEREST GROWING.**

Hundreds Heard Evangelist Victor Dorris Last Night.

The interest in the evangelistic services which are being held at the First Christian church is growing, and many additions to the church will probably be the result of the labor of Rev. Victor Dorris in this city. The spacious auditorium was taxed to its utmost seating capacity to accommodate those who were present at the morning and evening services yesterday. Rev. Dorris spoke upon the subject of the "Early Church Work," and the great results which it has accomplished. "The Vine and the Branches" was the evening theme, which was one of the most masterful addresses which has been heard in the city for some time. At the conclusion of the sermon ten came forward and made their simple yet far-reaching confessions of the Christian faith to take membership in the local congregation. There have been 12 converts during the series of meetings, which services will continue during this week and next Sunday.
