WORLD'S HIGHEST DAM.

Shoshone River Dam Will Be Two Hundred and Forty Feet in Height.

The city engineer in charge of the Cody canyon dam, Mr. McGregory, is working a big force of men there says the Mellette, Wyo., News. The division dam now stops the entire Shoshone river and through a long flume and a 12-foot granite tunnel the stream is conveyed and empties below the dam site, leaving the bed of the river at that point entirely dry.

The problem is to excavate from the natural bed of the stream down to a depth of 67 feet to bed rock on a slope of one to one.

Once the bed rock is cleared this immense hole must be filled with concrete to make the foundation for the dam, and before the June rise of 1908 this must be completed up to the natural bed of the river, when work will have to be suspended until after the high water of 1908, when the contractor expects to be able to complete the superstructure to be of solid granite and concrete 240 feet from river bed to cap stone—the highest dam in the world.

The width of this great canyon (between the towering granite walls) at the river bed is 80 feet and at the top 120 feet. Large and costly engines, boilers, rock crushers, cranes, cables and air compressing machinery have been installed and are now in daily operation.

The contractors are now arranging to put on three shifts of men and work 24 hours daily, as it of vital importance that the foundation walls be completed before the next flood water, in order to save great loss. Once completed, this dam will impound a vast body of water to be conserved for use in the late summer season to irrigate the 200,000 and odd acres of desert land at Corbett, Ralston, Carland, Frannie and Crowley.

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TALK ABOUT TRUSTS

Chicago, Oct. 22.—What gives rise to being the most important conference on the subject of trusts combinations of capital and labor held in any country was inaugurated here today under the auspices of the National Civic Federation.

The opening session was devoted to consideration of problems involved in the controversy between the federal and state governments respecting jurisdiction over interstate commerce now pending in several western and southern states. Representatives appointed by the governors of these states and territories, from Maine to California, are in attendance. Also all national labor, agricultural, commercial, financial, economic and trade organizations and chambers of commerce, bar associations and shippers organizations have also sent delegates. Herbert Knox Smith, commissioner of corporations, Commissioner E. E. Clark of the interstate commerce commission, and other representatives of the government are in attendance and will present the case of the federal regulation of railroad corporations. As bespeaking widespread interest in the problem presented by the trusts and the necessity for their regulation, the delegates represent every walk of life and include labor leaders, United States senators, congressmen, farmers, manufacturers, merchants,

clergymen, attorneys, educators and bankers.

Being held at a time when the entire country is aroused in regard to the control of trusts and the many problems arising from the enforcement of the Sherman anti-trust law and the amended interstate commerce act, the conference is likely to have a notable and far-reaching effect in giving direction to public sentiment.

Tomorrow the delegates to the conference will devote to a consideration of the corporation problem embraced in the following questions:

How should a corporation be constructed? Should there be national corporations, as well as state? What should be the basis of capitalization of corporations? The methods of their internal control? What provisions should be made looking to the protection of investors and other stockholders? Should there be a distinction between public service and other corporations? Should quasi public utilities, like gas, electric lighting and street railways, be considered natural monopolies, to be regulated by the municipal government?

Thursday's and Friday's sessions will be given up to a discussion of various phases of the general topic, including the just and practicable limit of restriction and regulation, both federal and state, of combinations in production, distribution, transportation and labor, and the question: Shall the Sherman anti-trust law be amended, and if so, in what manner? Tariff and free trade in relation to trusts will likely furnish a spirited debate. The relation of labor unions and farmers' organizations to trusts will be considered at length from all standpoints. The alleged covert attempt to muzzle the freedom of the press by raising the price of white paper to a point where profitable publication of newspapers will soon be rendered impossible will be discussed by officials and members of the American Newspaper Publishers' association. President J. A. Everitt, of the American Society of Equity, is on the program for an address on the bearing of trusts on the production and sale of farm products.

New York, the home of nearly all the great trusts of the country, is represented by an especially distinguished delegation, which has established headquarters at the Auditorium Annex. Among the metropolitan representatives are ex-Mayor Seth Low, Dr. Albert Shaw, editor of the American Review of Reviews; Herman Ridder, manager of the Staats-Zeitung; Hamilton Holt, Jas. B. Reynolds, W. J. Schieffelin, representing the chamber of commerce, and Marcus M. Marks, of the consolidation committee of the American Civic Federation.

Among those who have prominently identified themselves with the conference and whose labors were largely instrumental in bringing it largely are President Nicholas Murray Butler, of Columbia university, who acted as chairman of the committee of arrangement; Samuel Gompers, of the American Federation of Labor; N. J. Bachelder, of the National Grange; Andrew Carnegie, August Belmont, Archbishop Ireland, Clarence H. Mackey, John Mitchell, of the United Mine Workers; Grand Master P. H. Morrissey, of the railroad trainmen; Grand Chief W. S. Stone, of the locomotive engineers; President Judson, of the University of Chicago; Charles G. Dawes, ex-comptroller of the currency, and D. R. Forgan, president of the Merchants' Association of Chicago.

It is likely that the subject of the \$29,240,000 fine imposed by Judge Landis on the Standard Oil company will become a subject for discussion at future sessions of the conference.

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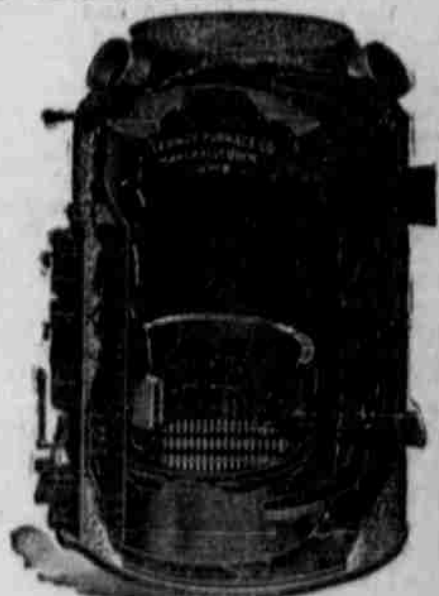
