ARTISTIC FRESCO WORK

Elmer E. Wood Completes a Beautiful Piece of Decorated Finishing

The workmen have just completed the work of frescoing the First Methodist church of this city, and it presents a beautiful and restful interior to the large congregations that worship there. The artist took for the keynote of his decorative scheme two banks of the great pipe organ, that are pale green with gold ornaments, and the whole ornamentation of the church seems to spring from the central theme suggested by the musical instrument. The body of the church, walls and ceiling is a light green, blending into panels of creamy yellow, that has a slight greenish tinge, such as one sees in the sky sometimes after an Oregon sunset. There is a decorative base and borders next to the ceiling. The panels are bordered and the great groins of woodwork that spring from the floor to the top of the gothic arch are of an old ivory color. The entrance is of a darker terra cotta and cream ceilings. Back of the organ loft are panels that stand out with striking effect of reality, latticed screens and three gothic windows with light streaming upon an open Bible in the central window. The work was done by Elmer E. Woods of this city, who is also executing a contract for the Academy of the Sacred Heart. He has done work in Kansas City, Ashland and California cities, but now makes Salem his home.

The work he has done at the Methodist church is the largest contract he has executed in Salem, and will speak for itself. It is understood to be very satisfactory to the committee. The expense of decorating this large church—the largest in the city—was about \$600, and the Methodists can boast about the best finished house of worship in the Capital City.

London, Oct. 22.—The shareholders voted to sell Barnum & Bailey's circus to Ringling for \$410,000 today. They admitted that the show had not paid dividends since Bailey's death.

Bartoz Awarded \$1112.50.
The jury in the condemnation proceedings of the State vs. Joseph Bartoz this afternoon, at 2 o'clock, after being out about half an hour, returned a verdict in favor of the defendant for \$1112.50. Mr. Bartoz asked \$3500 for his lease on the 133 acres owned by Mrs. J. M. Miller, condemned by the state to be used for the home for the feeble minded. The state offered \$350 for the lease, and to get possession of the property brought suit. Mr. Bartoz leased the property from Mrs. Miller a year ago for a term of five years, and claimed that he had worked very hard and had been to quite an expense in fixing up the place since he took possession, and, being unable to obtain a farm suited to his business, felt justified in making the demand.
