WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY.

There is this to be said about Mr. Marconi, that whenever we hear from him it is not with respect to what he is going to do, but what he has done.

Almost simultaneously with the statement that reliable transmission over very long distances has been attained, an office was opened for handling commercial messages.

While the wireless transmission for very long distances seem to have been advanced to the commercial stage, the history of electrical developments will come from experience.

As to competing with cables, it is evident that if cables compete at all it must be by better service.

The cost of operating by wireless is much greater than by cable, owing to the very heavy electric power which it is necessary to develop, but it has not to bear the expense of laying the costly cables with their risk of damage and the enormous expense of repairs.

Aerograms are cheaper than telegrams.

The question is, Are they "just as good?"

It was expected that instruments could be "attuned" to each other so that only instruments identically attuned would receive messages.

How far this has been accomplished we are not informed, but current reports seem to indicate that almost any instrument will catch any message.

This involves the use of special cipher codes when secrecy is desired, and it is extremely difficult to construct a cipher code which an expert cannot decipher.

Codes are used largely in all commercial business, but they are usually printed codes accessible to any one.

Special codes, however, can be readily made to be used between those doing much business together, and, while they could probably be deciphered, they are not likely to be caught and delivered to one having interest to decipher them.

Nor can a cipher message usually be deciphered without a good deal of time and quite a number of messages.

There is, therefore, no apparent reason why wireless telegraphy should not come into general commercial use, even if it has not yet been found possible to prevent messages from being caught by unauthorized persons.

INDIANS ALLOWED TO GAMBLE

Gambling at the Indian pow-wow at Toppenish ended last night says the Yakima Republic. Sunday afternoon Lancaster Spencer, talking through an interpreter, announced that with the close of the day would come the expiration of the six days' special gambling permission given him by the Indian agency. He pointed out how fortunate the Indians has been to procure that privilege, not allowed elsewhere, and expressed the hope that they had had a good time.

Bone Game Is New and Exciting.

All sorts of card games have been played during the week and hundreds of dollars have changed hands but the big games have been the Indian bone games.

One game during the week had about \$600 in the blanket and play lasted from 9 o'clock in the morning until 5 in the evening before the ownership of the money was decided.

The bone game yesterday, played with about 24 Indians on each side, had over \$200 in the blanket when the play began. A great deal was added during the contest, while blankets, saddles and other equipment made up deficiencies in coin.

A crowd of several hundred people, many of them white spectators, watched the play. The game is one of the most spectacular of the Indian gambling games, and is declared to be as good a medium of expression
