Survey Line to Salem.

Eugene, Or., Oct. 23.—The Eugene & Eastern Railway Company Monday afternoon started a corps of surveyors to make the preliminary survey for an electric line north from Eugene to connect with the Salem-Portland line, for which another crew of surveyors is working south from Albany. The proposed line will extend north from Eugene to Junction along what is known as the "river road," which traverses one of the richest stretches of country in the world. It is along the river bottom, and the soil raises some of the finest fruit and vegetables that grow. This section of the country is thickly populated, and there will be plenty of local business for the proposed line.

The surveyors have just finished the final surveys for the Eugene-Springfield line, and construction east from the Eugene city limits will begin some time next week. L. N. Roney, who has the contract for the construction of the bridge across the Willamette at Springfield, is assembling his materials, and will begin actual construction as soon as all danger from high water is over in the spring. As soon as the line is completed to the bridge site, cars will be run and passengers carried to Springfield. They will have to cross the wagon bridge there on foot to enter the town until the railroad bridge is completed.
