Oregon's Schedule of Games for the Season.

The team from the state university will clip the second game from its schedule next Saturday, October 26, when it meets the strong team from the University of Idaho on Multnomah field, Portland.

Idaho enters the field this year with all but one of the team that she had last year and is reported to have a much stronger team in every way than they had last year.

Oregon lost four of her best men last June by graduation of Hug, Chandler, Lataurette and McKinney. However the outlook for a winning team this year is very bright. Between 35 and 40 men have been out for practice every night from whom men will be selected to fill the places of those who have left college.

The game of Saturday the 19th with Pacific did not show the relative strength of the Oregon team since the eleven from Pacific was much too light and inexperienced to make a good showing possible against the heavy team from the state university. Although Oregon won by a large score there were some points in which the team was a little ragged.

On the other hand the Oregon team seemed to have imbibed "a fighting spirit" which has been such a noticeable characteristic of teams in years past. They were particularly good on the defensive, as far as could be judged by last Saturday's game.

The line-up of the team as it will probably be next Saturday is as follows:

Center, Scott; guards, Moulton and McIntire; tackles, Arnsperger, Pinkham; ends, Coleman, Capt. Moores, or a substitute; halves, Zacharias, Taylor or Oberhauser; full Clark; quarter, Kuykendall.

Coleman, a former Willamette player, is playing an exceptionally fine defensive game at end. Taylor is the only man of the team who is not a veteran. Moulton's familiar figure is again seen with the team and undoubtedly will add further glory to himself this year. He is a source of great strength to the team since his great accuracy in booting the pigskin practically won the Idaho and Multnomah games last year for Oregon.

The officials in Saturday's game will be as follows: R. N. Hackenberry, of Portland, umpire; Frank Lonergan, captain of M. A. A. C., referee; J. A. Horan, Portland, field judge.

IDAHO AGAINST OREGON

Idaho Team In Portland This Morning --Other Baseball News

Portland, Oct. 25.—Coach Middleton and his squad of 18 men from the University of Idaho, reached Portland this morning, and put up at the Hotel Perkins. When they arrived a fine drizzling rain was falling, but Middleton immediately went out to look at the field, and said practice will take place this afternoon at 2 o'clock. "We expect to defeat Oregon," he said. "I am not figuring on the score, but on victory. My men are a big and powerful lot, with lots of strength. The question of speed will not be settled until the men have a chance to show what they can do in uniforms." The University of Oregon in charge of Gordon Bennett Frost, will reach Portland tonight and stay at the Imperial. Frost is non-committal. The Oregon team will be accompanied by 100 rooters, as well as a large number of students from down state. There is little betting on the result, as Idaho is unknown.

Saturday's Football Games.

New York, Oct. 25.—New York football enthusiasts will be afforded an opportunity to witness a game at home tomorrow, when Princeton and Cornell will test conclusions on a metropolitan gridiron. The New Jersey Tigers will probably be favorites in the betting, but they will have their work cut out for them in defeating the husky squad from Ithaca. Next in point of interest among the games scheduled for tomorrow is that between the Carlisle Indians and Pennsylvania, to be played in Philadelphia. The redskins will go to William Penn's town with blood in their eyes and the Quakers will have to play a fast and snappy game to save their scalps.

Little interest attaches to the games to be pulled off tomorrow at Cambridge and New Haven. The Crimson will likely have little trouble in piling up a big score against Springfield training school, and the Elia will also have a comparatively soft snap in Villa Nova. The soldiers at West Point will take on an easy mark in Rochester while the navy is defeating Lafayette at Annapolis.

Among the smaller eastern institutions, the most important games will be between Amherst and Dartmouth at Amherst, Brown and Williams at Providence, Syracuse and Hamilton at Syracuse, Swarthmore and Gettysburg at Swarthmore, Washington and Jefferson and West Virginia at Washington, Pa., Lehigh and Dickinson at Carlisle and Tufts and Maine at Medford.

In the south, the principal games will be between George Washington and Randolph-Macon, Georgia and

Alabama and Suwanee and Mississippi. In the west, Ohio state will play at Michigan, Illinois at Wisconsin and Drake at Iowa.

GRAND JURY REPORTS

Finds Nothing Criminal But Thinks Council Was Careless

The grand jury yesterday afternoon submitted a report exonerating the city council and all, who were connected with the construction of the new concrete bridge on North Commercial street.

The grand jury was of the opinion that the investigation should have properly been made by the city council, thus saving much needless expense and should the council in such investigation have found that any officer or person connected with the matter had been dishonest referred such case to the jury, and not the general investigation. There were 27 witnesses examined in the investigation which meant no small amount of expense but the result of the grand jury's work is probably worth the money to the taxpayers.

The report of the jury in part was as follows:

"In the circuit court of the state of Oregon for Marion county. To the Honorable George H. Burnett, judge of said court.

Dear sir, we the grand jury empaneled at the present term of court beg leave to report at the request of the city council of Salem, we have investigated the conduct of the city officers of Salem in reference to the building of the concrete bridge across North Commercial street and in so doing we have called before us as witnesses all of the members of the present council, the members of the last council, the present mayor, the last mayor, the city recorder, the city attorney and the city overseer, of the work on said bridge. We have examined all of the contracts entered into by the city with the General Constructing company and Portland General Electric company pertaining to this said matter and called at the city recorder's office and examined into all the city records pertaining to the matter.

In addition we have examined the manager and assistant manager of the Portland General Electric company, also the local manager of the General Construction company and a member of the local press, a total of 27 witnesses."

The grand jury went in a body to the bridge and report that "there is a vast difference of opinion as to the merits of the bridge. We are of the opinion that the city council did not look after all of the details in building the bridge that it should. Especially we think that the city should have had plans and specifications drawn showing the amount of extra work that should have been done according to the supplementary contract. We have been unable to gather any evidence that would show or intimate that any of the officers of the city government have acted dishonestly in connection with this

matter; in fact we have seen nothing connected with the building of the bridge that would reflect on the integrity of any of the members of the present or past council or the officers or the past council or the agents of the Portland General Electric Company or the agents of the General Construction company."

The report is signed by Smith, foreman; B. E. Johnson, Hobson, H. Palmer, J. A. Mather, A. Mempel, A. C. Snyder.
