Must Go Back to Pen— A requisition from the governor of California was honored this morning by Governor Chamberlain for Joseph Lorey, who is wanted in California. Lorey was convicted of murder in the second degree in Contra Costa county for the killing of Leo Elaman, was sentenced to 20 years in the pen, but escaped and was arrested in Portland a few days ago.

Krebs Sues Livesley— The Krebs Hop Company has filed an action for damages in department No. 1 of the circuit court against T. A. Livesley and John J. Roberts, demanding judgment for \$6000, which amount is claimed as due the plaintiffs as damages, owing to the defendants refusing to receive a lot of hops for which they had contracted. The complaint sets forth that the Krebs Hop Company in 1904 entered into a contract with Livesley and Roberts, whereby the latter bought 500,000 pounds of hops, to be delivered in five equal lots, not later than the 15th of October in each of the years, 1905, 1906, 1907, 1908 and 1909. The plaintiffs claim that they had the 100,000 pounds ready for delivery this year, as agreed upon, but that the defendants refused to receive them.

THEY SOLD HAMS.

Men Accused of Film-Flamming Un-suspecting Housewives.

Chief of Police Gibson, acting under instructions from Woodburn, last evening arrested Sid Osboree and J. F. Gibbins, who are wanted in Woodburn to answer a charge of using light weights. The two have been peddling cured hams in various towns in the valley, buying small hams, so it is claimed, and selling them to unsuspecting housewives at an advance of several pounds. The sharpers each had a small balance scale, the fronts of which they were able to slide up, thus bringing the six or eight-pound mark to the place formerly occupied by the zero mark. In this way, if the slide was up to the eight-pound mark, if an article weighed one pound it would register nine pounds.

Mrs. Morcom, among others at Woodburn, yesterday bought a ham of the men, who represented that they were farmers living in that vicinity, and when her husband, Attorney Morcom, came home at noon he remarked that the ham seemed very small. The meat was then weighed, and the deception learned. After an inquiry had been made it was found that many others had been the victims of the ham swindle, and Attorney Morcom swore out a warrant for the arrest of the crooks.

Marshal Amos Beach found trace of the men last evening about 6 o'clock, when they were near the Hazel Green school house, two miles north of this city, and telephoned Chief of Police Gibson, who captured the men in Salem.

Mr. Beach came to the city this morning to take charge of the prisoners.

Port Warden Appointed— Governor Chamberlain yesterday reappointed Captain A. W. McIntosh port warden of the Columbia district for a term of four years.

Demand Return of Money— J. L. Misner, yesterday filed an action in department No. 1 of the circuit court against W. L. Jerman, demanding a judgment for \$100, which is set forth in the complaint as being due the plaintiff as damages, and for \$420 which was advanced on property bought by Misner from the defendant, who failed to deliver the property, according to the contract. The complaint sets forth that Mr. Misner bought property in Woodburn on October 5, 1907, and that Jerman agreed to transfer a certain 10-foot strip leading from the property to the street. Misner advanced \$420 and moved to Woodburn from Portland, with his family, and claims that Jerman did not own the strip of land which he agreed to deliver with the property. Misner, therefore, asks for the return of the \$420 and for \$100 damages.
