MULKEY'S PLAIN ANSWER

the Republican Party Selects a Democrat For Senator He Will Stand By Decision

A prominent Salem Republican has written Hon. Fred W. Mulkey, Portland, who is a candidate for the United States senate, asking him if he can reconcile his support of Republican principles with his declaration that according to the terms of Statement No. 1, he will support the choice of the people for United States senator if that choice should be a Democrat. He has written the following reply:

Portland, Oct. 25, 1907. I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of Oct. 19th, which I herewith enclose. As I understand the purport of your letter, some republicans ask me how I can reconcile my support of the Republican principles with my declaration that I would support a Democrat for United States senator if he were successful at the polls. In answer I have to state, that I regard my obligations to the Republican party and its principles as fulfilled by voting for the party candidates at the election held in June. That by a vote of the people the poll of the Republican party are re-elected, then I sufficiently believe in the rule of the majority to abide by the vote of the people; I believe that to be an obligation of citizenship higher than the demands that my party can place upon the conscience of those who declare allegiance to the principles of that party. There is a Republican majority in the state of Oregon ranging anywhere from twenty thousand to thirty thousand, and if the members of the Republican party want to regulate their candidates, I consider it to be a fault of the party itself and not mine. I would exceedingly regret that a Democrat be selected by the voters of Oregon as their choice for the United States senator, and yet I believe that by an open and frank avowal to support a Democrat if he is successful at the polls, I am more conscientious in my duty to the party than those Republicans who secretly knife the party candidate in the ballot box.

"Certainly the election of United States senators by direct vote of the people is an issue greater than any party issue. The people of the state want it, I agree with them in it, and they are entitled to it as near as can be approached under constitutional provisions. The only objection to it is raised on the part of dissatisfied politicians. Their dissatisfaction extends not only to Statement No. 1 of the primary law, but to the entire direct primary law. You will find that the politician that wants to be a boss or wants and expects to participate in the patronage distributed by a boss is against Statement No. 1, and the direct primary law. You will find that every man who is opposed to a majority

rule and favors a rule by an aristocratic minority is against Statement No. 1 and all of the provisions of the direct primary law. You will find that every man who believes that the United States senatorship should be sold to the highest bidder is against Statement No. 1, and the entire provisions of the direct primary law. The only object of the creating of a sentiment in favor of the modified statement whereby a legislative candidate pledges himself to vote for the party nominee is to create a subterfuge. These men are so partisan that they are willing to carry their politics in direct contravention of the will of the people. A preponderance of sentiment in favor of the qualified statement is an opening wedge for a plan that is being formulated to abrogate the direct primary law.

"In this letter to you I desire to reaffirm my allegiance to the Republican party and its principles, but I will not follow the Republican party, or any of its members, to the extent of participating directly and knowingly, or innocently in a movement that would be calculated to re-establish the old order of boss ruled, manipulated conventions and hold-up legislative sessions.
