TIMELY ADVICE

Unless all conditions fall there is going to be a scarcity of fuel at Salem this winter as has not been known before. Wood is high already and is going much higher still. Last August we urged consumers of fuel to order their winter supply of coal. All who did buy then saved considerable money. We have just been notified by the mine that coal has advanced one dollar per ton, and that another advance may be expected shortly. We therefore advise folks to order their coal.

At One. Coal Is Cheaper Than Wood

One ton of coal will do you more good than two cords of wood. From now on cord wood will cost you between seven and eight dollars per cord, if not more, when ready to burn. If ordered before November 15 your coal will cost you ten dollars per ton for nut coal and twelve dollars per ton for lump coal. All orders must be accompanied by cash.

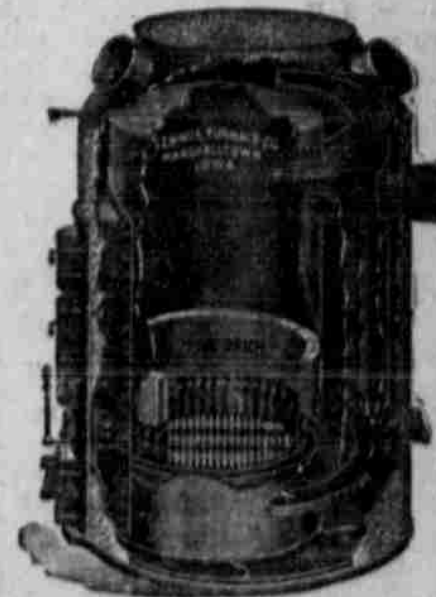
