## COMING SALEM PRIMARY

Will Nominate 'One' Alderman From Each Ward—Empty Honors and Empty Offices If the Charter Is Adopted

There has been a very light registration at Salem for the coming primaries. But even 500 registered voters are better than the little old packed delegate convention. Citizens in each ward should still go to the city hall and register and vote at the primary. The charter will not be voted upon until 30 days after the primaries are held. It is the general feeling that the primaries should be held and candidates for aldermen nominated in each ward. If in the 30 days public sentiment goes against the charter there will be no need of holding a special election to fill vacancies. All should understand that adoption of the charter will reduce the city council to seven members, one from each ward holding over—the present holdover councilmen staying in office. The primary election will be held on Saturday, November 2. Recorder Moores stated that the registration books would be kept open until 9 o'clock Thursday evening, in order to give workmen a chance to register.
