The county school superintendent is busy this week preparing the blanks for the 1907 school census and sending them to the clerks of the various districts of the county. The census will be taken during the last week in November and the report is required to be returned to the county superintendent on or before December 10. The school apportionment for Marion county for this fall is as follows: County apportionment for fall of 1907, \$51,414.97; state fund for Marion county for the year 1907, \$16,326.43. Last fall the apportionment of the county was \$50,562.81, and the state fund for the year was \$17,567.80.
