Today's Eugene Guard says: "The local officials of the Booth Company met with the superintendents of the four sawmills operating in the company and L. S. Hill, acting superintendent, this afternoon to discuss the present situation of the lumber business. It has been decided to keep all the mills for the present, only the planing and the several plants now being operated. It was thought best to keep the output of the mills on account of the lack of demand for lumber pending the settlement of the rate matter and to fill all the orders from the stocks on hand, each having a large amount of lumber of all kinds in stock. There will be activity on the part of the company in the financial situation immediately and the other matters referred to are settled."

CZAR IS STUBBORN NOT STUPID

Boston, Mass., Nov. 6.—Kellogg Durland, a Boston student of social conditions, reached home from Europe Tuesday. He was detained for two days, two weeks ago, by Russian authorities in St. Petersburg, together with William English Walling, Mrs. Walling and Rose Strunsky. Durland evaded the Russian authorities just as he was about to be arrested, and hastened home. The Wallings left St. Petersburg soon after their arrest, and are now in Berlin, where they will remain a month, after which they go to Paris for the winter.
Durland says that the Czar is a drunkard, that he is influenced by spiritualists and fakirs, and that he consulted the noted mediums, Philippe and Father John, when he desired a son to be born as his heir. Durland asserts that the Czar is stubborn, rather than stupid.

TRAIN RAN AWAY.

The Engineer, L. White, and a Bookkeeper, Walter Asberry, Killed.

Nanamio, B. C., Nov. 6.—Two men were killed near Chemainus yesterday when a logging train ran away down a steep mountain grade. The engineer, L. White, dashed his head against a stump while in the act of jumping from the runaway train. He was instantly killed. Walter Asberry, the camp bookkeeper, jumped but lost his balance when he struck the ground and his body was thrown on the rails. Several cars passed over him. He died a few moments later.

The remaining members of the train crew were uninjured, though all of them jumped.

The locomotive and cars continued to the bottom of the grade, jumped the track and piled itself in a mass of debris at the bottom of the gulch.

Cabinet Talks of Finance.

Washington, Nov. 6.—President Roosevelt conferred with his advisors today, supposedly on the financial situation. Secretary Cortelyou was called twice during the forenoon.

He announced that he had made an additional response to the appeal of the Minnesota bankers for financial assistance. The additional deposit is supposed to have been \$3,000,000.

Railroad Trouble Settled.

Chicago, Nov. 6.—An agreement has been reached between the Alton road and its trainmen, which settles all differences between them. The pay of conductors, trackmen, firemen, baggagemen is affected by the agreement, the new rates to go into effect November 1. The men entered a protest against "double-head" trains, and were informed that the policy of the road was not to run them, and that they would be reduced to a minimum. All wages were increased uniformly 10 per cent.
