

DAY ATTACKS PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT

We Are "Living Under a Monarchy in Everything But Name," and Speaks of the Agitative and Disruptive Administration.

Washington, Nov. 8.—All political Washington, which means pretty much all of the capital city that is worth considering, has been sitting for the past two nights reading the book that made its appearance at bookstores here unheralded a couple of days ago. It has been none other than the White House series were lighted later than usual and it is suspected that some of the Roosevelt family members have been looking over the volume that has caused so much discussion.

It is not because of its literary qualities that the book has been read upon so eagerly, but because of its title, "The Raid on Prosperity," and the fact that it contains one of the most bitter attacks upon the policies and acts of the administration that was ever made upon any president of the United States.

The author is a Syracuse university professor who some months ago attracted considerable attention, most of it unfavorable, by his public denunciation of the Standard Oil company. Through his pamphlet and consequently his reputation for peace, Dr. Day does not mince his words, but throws his verbal brickbats in the direction of the White House that probably would result in his spending a long time in jail if President Roosevelt possessed the power of his distinguished friend, Emperor William, or if less majesty were an offense recognized by the American people. From Chancellor Day's point of view, apparently, it would not be a surprising thing if such a law were enacted, for he declares in his book that "for many months we have been living under a monarchy in everything but the name."

A few of Dr. Day's remarks show a kind of hot shot that he pours upon almost every page. "With the type of statesmen of Lincoln, Wilson, Cleveland and McKinley," he says, "we should have nothing to do. With the present agitative and disruptive administration and with the voices of the other political parties echoing the same ranting about the tyranny of capitalists, we may expect a revolution which shall be a conspicuous date in history for the sober-thinking people of this country as an imperiled inheritance."

Another place he says: "A people who have been self-governing by constitutional process, whose credit has extended over the earth with their commerce and manufacture, whose aberrations and obliquities in comparison with their general character are as small as the sum—this people is being hunted along every railway. Every corporation, over every way of trade by their President, Heaven's name what a spectacle of a constitutional America! It is a disgrace to a South American republic."

Messages might be quoted from almost every page to show that Chancellor Day is decidedly excited over the state of the country, and to point out the excitement he has caused here among the friends of the administration. There are rumors that the President was first induced to make a reply that would have been just as scolding as Dr. Day's charges, but that it was finally decided that this would be undignified and that it would be better to have some prominent supporter of the administration take up the matter.

It is generally understood that Senator Beveridge is the man who has been selected to cross swords with the Syracuse university president. The Indiana senator was one of the first to read the book. "It is one of the strongest pieces of controversial writing I ever read," he immediately said. "I should like to reply to it." A man who is in close touch with administration circles is authority for the statement that negotiations have already begun with Appleton & Company, the publishers of the Day book, to bring out a reply by Senator Beveridge and that this will make its appearance after the first of the year.

Ribbon Sachets.

Sachets, really pretty ones, that would please the most fastidious, may be fashioned from a yard of ribbon if it is not more than four inches in width. Where wider ribbon is liked the length should be proportionately increased. Tie in an ordinary bow-knot. See that the knot is tight, so that the loops have the proper "perk" air. Place sachet powder between two layers of thin cotton sheeting, cutting this padding just a trifle narrower than the ribbon loops, then with fine silk that matches the ribbon overhand the edges of the loops, so that they form bags to hold the perfumed cotton. Fringe or trim the ends of the bow and place in a dainty holly decorated box.

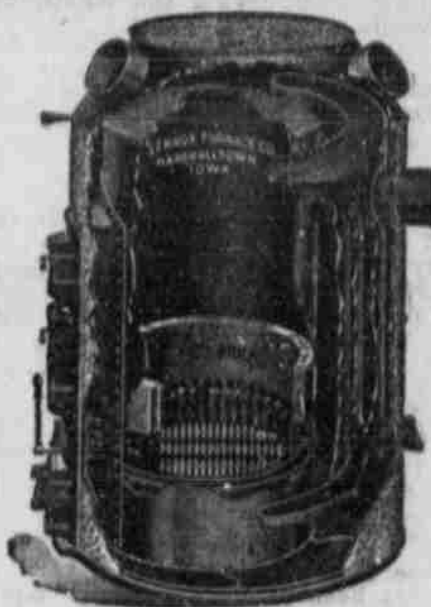
