New York, Nov. 9.—Heinrich Con-
reid was relieved today to receive a
wireless message assuring him that
Enrico Caruso was a passenger on
the Oceanic, which is bringing the
members of the Metropolitan com-
pany that were to have sailed on the
disabled Kaiser Wilhelm. In spite
of a telegram that the singers had
sailed, Conreid was uneasy about the
tenor.

In transferring the singers to the
Oceanic it was difficult to find places
for them, as the boat was full. Sig-
nor Caruso was satisfied until his sec-
retary learned that it was impossible
to get a suite with a bath. In spite
of the efforts of the company such
an apartment could not be had.

Then Signor Caruso cabled Con-
reid that he absolutely refused to
sail on the date fixed.

Honolulu, Nov. 9.—R. P. Scher-
win, general manager of the Pacific

the Oriental run. The chamber had
asked him for a definite statement of
the intentions of his company as to
providing Hawaii with a better pas-
senger service, suitable for tourists.
To this he held out no hopes what-
ever, hinting at a possible suspension
of the service from San Francisco al-
together.

MINISTERS CRITICISE BUT ITS GOOD

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Washington, Nov. 9.—While the
state of Oklahoma will not be en-
titled to have its star placed on the
national flag until July 4, 1908, it
has already been given its place on
the national coins, the new ten-dollar
gold pieces just being put into cir-
culation have 46 raised stars. Okla-
homa has not yet officially been ad-
mitted to the Union, but will be on
the 16th of this month, when the
President issues his proclamation.
General criticism is heard of the
new gold pieces in Washington, and
word has been received that a protest
is on the way to Washington from
various Pittsburg ministers against
the omission of the motto "In God
We Trust."

THEY SMUGGLED IN.

Ten Thousand Orientals Came Dur-
ing the Past Year.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Vancouver, B. C., Nov. 9.—Ten
thousand three hundred Orientals
have arrived in Vancouver since the
beginning of this year. Of these 8000
are Japanese, 2000 are Hindoos and
300 Chinese. Two thousand of the
Japanese have crossed the bound-
ary line into the United States, at
least 500 of them illegally. One-
third of the Chinese who have
reached here have smuggled them-
selves into the United States.

CORPSES ARE BOTH ALIKE

Los Angeles Doctor Gets a Jolt When
Second Victim of Street Car Is
Brought to Him—The Men Were
Strangers, But Side by Side in the
Morgue Could Not Be Told Apart.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 8.—Two
men both killed by street cars in
identically the same way, and exactly
12 hours apart, and who resemble
each other so closely that relatives
of one could identify him from the
other only by his clothes, were acci-
dentally placed side by side on the
slabs in the morgue Friday. Each
sustained a fracture of the skull by
stepping before a swift car, one last
night, the other this morning. Both
are 45 years old, have a scrubby
mustache, gray eyes, gray tinged hair
and are 5 feet, 10 inches in height.
One is Peter McGillan, of this city,
whose son is first assistant engineer
on the steamer Santa Rosa. His dead
double is Jas. Harvey, formerly em-
ployed on the Tonopah & Tidewater
railroad.

cared for the second.
"My hair stood upon end," said
Dr. Tanner, "when they brought the
second man in. I was almost ready
to swear that the first man had come
to life at the morgue, and they had
brought him back to show me up as
not knowing when a man is dead."

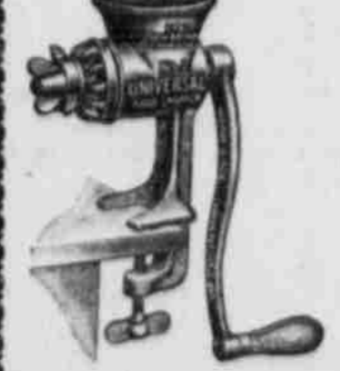

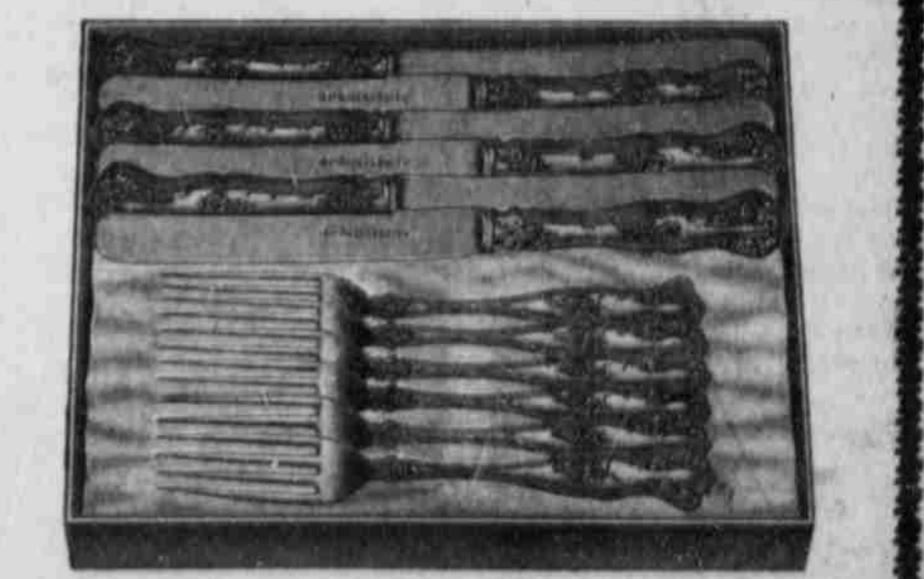
