(Continued from page one.) responsible for the death of...

four months before he was shot down at the Hotel Raleigh in this city, Senator Brown specifically denied the paternity of Mrs. Bradley's children.

"I do not give or devise or bequeath anything to any of the children of Mrs. Anna M. Bradley" is the language of the will. "I do not think either or any child born to Mrs. Anna M. Bradley is or are mine, but whether such child or children is or not I expressly provide that neither or any of them shall receive anything from my estate. I have never married Anna M. Bradley and never intended to. If she should pretend that any such relation ever existed between us to justify such interference, I direct my executor to contest any claims of any kind that she may present and I direct that she receive nothing from my estate."

Mr. Brown bequeathed all his property, valued at about \$75,000, to his two children, by the first and second wife, Alice Brown and Max Brown.

"Mr. Brown was a coward," says Mrs. Bradley. "He was afraid of his children, Max and Annie. They did not want him to marry me because they did not want to share the family property with my children. Arthur Brown listened, and wavered and promised, and evaded. Now he is dead. We had no quarrel. Three weeks before Arthur's death we ate our Thanksgiving dinner happily together. Then we walked up Main street, to Third street, and there, on the most crowded thoroughfare of the city, he took me in his arms and kissed me. When I expostulated, he exclaimed, 'All the world knows I love you. You're the only woman in the world I ever loved, Dolly—the only woman I could ever tolerate.' 'He had promised that we would be married last New Year's day. Then something made him change his mind, and—then came the end. We cannot always be self-controlled. The wisest are rash sometimes. I had loved him so much. I had been so true. I was the mother of his children, but I knew he wanted to cast me off. My one thought was and always has been to put my children right before the world. He had tried to deny that the children were his. I have proof that they were. I think only of my poor little children. For myself, I am not afraid. If there is a God, He understands.' The proof of the paternity of her children Mrs. Bradley will attempt to furnish by means of love letters written her by Senator Brown. The letters are ardent in character and refer frequently to the children whom Brown disowned in his will. Among them is the following expression of devotion to the woman he had wronged:

"Dolly M., my own dear wife. Never were you so near and dear as now * * * Take good care of little Arthur Brown. He is your special care. Teach him, have him lean his letters. Keep at him until he has the wit and brilliancy of his mother. He is your charge. You remember the quotation, 'Your blood with mine commingled, yet shall mount the throne of kings.' My love, my little weepy, I am today more determined than ever that we shall be before the world what we are to each other. You are the one above all others who governs and controls me. I love you, I love you. Oh, how I want to hold you in my arms forever.

"ARTHUR." In another letter Senator Brown wrote:

"I think only of the duty I owe you, of the wrong I have done you and yours. I feel guilty that I am not always by your side, protecting you from insult and from injury, but if not there in body I will always be there in spirit. I can not quite tell you how dearly and devoted I love you. * * * I need you every hour to help to cheer you up and to hold you in my embrace. * * * You are my own dear wife; mine by a true love—your divine gift. I will try to protect you, to deserve you and will always be your own Arthur."

Among the impassioned utterances contained in other letters written by Senator Brown to Mrs. Bradley were the following:

"I love you in the truest, best sense a man can love a woman, not alone for the passion that is so warm between us, but in a higher and truer way. I love to be near you, to hear you, to be close to you."

"How I wish you and I and our boy were in a house of our own, loving each other as we will in the future. * * * Kiss the boy and know that I am loving you and have you ever in my mind and heart."

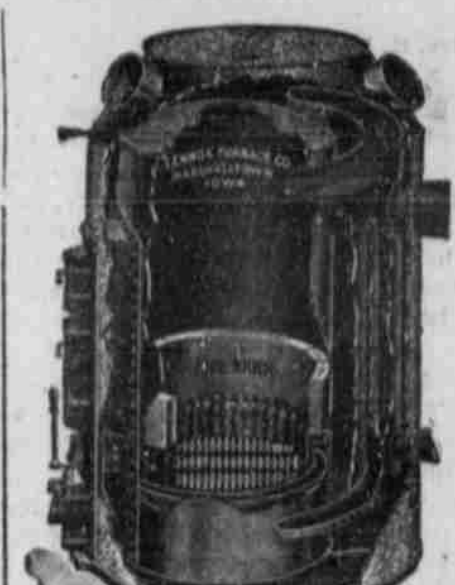

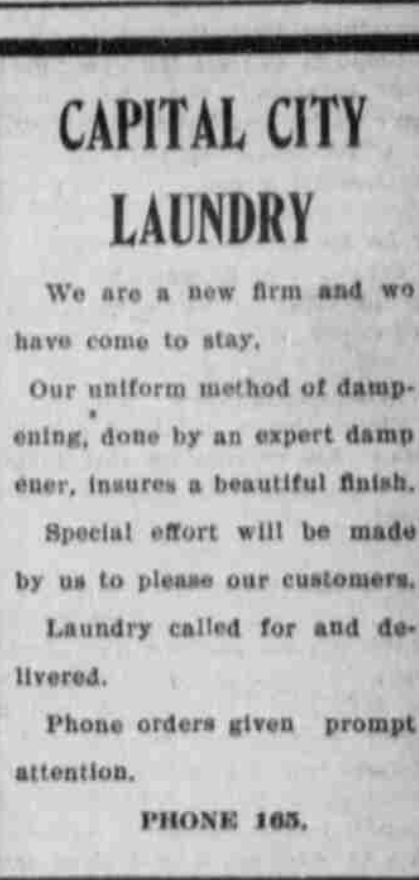

To Whom It May Concern. Notice is hereby given that complaint has been made to the health officer of the board of health of the city of Salem, Oregon, that the sanitary laws of the city and of the state of Oregon are being violated by many residents of the city who are maintaining closets over running streams of water and polluting the same, or are maintaining closets in such filthy condition as to be nuisances, are maintaining manure piles, refuse and decaying vegetable and animal matter in such condition as to be nuisances, and that such nuisances exist in close proximity to well, the water from which is used for drinking and domestic purposes. Such conditions, if they exist in the city of Salem, are a menace to the health of all persons living along such streams, or using water from such wells, and are liable to be the occasion of an epidemic of disease at any time. All residents of the city of Salem are hereby notified that on December 1, 1907, all pollution of streams of water flowing through the city, whether such pollution be caused from the use of closets built over such streams or otherwise, must cease, and that all closets and toilet rooms which are not connected with sewers or septic tanks must be thoroughly cleaned and put in a wholesome condition, and must be so placed and constructed that there will be no danger of the pollution of any water used for drinking or domestic purposes. Contagious disease, and birth and deaths occurring in the city are not always reported to the health officer as required by law, and the fact that contagious diseases exist in the city is sometimes concealed from the health officer. Any person concealing matters which should be reported to the health officer is liable to the penalty provided by law. This notice gives ample time for all persons to arrange for a full compliance with all state and city laws on the subjects herein mentioned. W.
