DIED.

RIDER—At the home of his daughter, Mrs. B. P. Taylor, on Asylum avenue, Saturday, November 9, 1907, at 1 p. m., Rev. William H. Rider, aged 82 years, after a lingering illness.

Mr. Rider about a year ago suffered a stroke of paralysis from which he never recovered. He was born in Half Moon valley in Pennsylvania, where he spent his early life. In 1850 he married Miss Mary Ellen Whitlatch and to the union was born eight children, four of whom and his wife survive. The children living are as follows: Mrs. B. P. Taylor and U. S. Rider of Salem; Mrs. A. M. Brown of Kapowsin, Washington, and Mrs. C. A. Bates of Seio. For the past 30 years Rev. Rider had been a resident of Oregon, living in Stayton, Roseburg and Niagara.

He was a veteran of the civil war, having served with distinction for four years as a member of the Company K, Thirty-fifth Missouri Infantry. He was a devout Christian, having been a Methodist minister which faith he retained to his death. The funeral services were conducted from the Taylor residence this afternoon at 1:30 by Rev. W. H. Selleck of this city. Interment in the City View cemetery under the auspices of the G. A. R.

ORIENTALS IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

The school authorities of the city of Savannah have voted from the night schools of that city a Japanese boy who had been recently admitted.

It is not alleged that there was anything objectionable in the action, but it is a deliberate declaration that the south will not be tormented with a new race issue.

The question of inferiority or superiority is not raised. When the Japanese and other Oriental governments come to stand and recognize this there will be an end of friction.
