SALEM HIGH VS. SEATTLE

Capital Kids Outplay the Great Big Lincolns in the First Half—Later Make a Grand Rally and Two Touchdowns at Close.

Salem high school football team returned from their game with Seattle high defeated, but proud of their record. The victorious team was much heavier and in superior condition.

The Seattle P.-I. has this account of the game:

The Lincoln high school football team of this city proved its class yesterday afternoon, when it beat Salem high, one of the strongest high school teams in Oregon, by two touchdowns, score 12 to 0. Clearly outplayed in the first half, Lincoln kept the southerners from reaching the goal line, and in the second half rallied and swept the Salem boys off their feet.

The lighter Oregon team played in lightning style in the first half, and twice gave Richardson chances to make a place kick, but the first was blocked by Beck, and the second missed. Niles, for Salem, out-punted Pike and Harvey, and his 40-yard kicks did much to strengthen Salem and keep the ball in Lincoln territory.

Superior Condition Tells. In the second half the superior condition of the Seattle men began to tell, and finally, after capturing a fumbled punt, Lincoln bucked the necessary 20 yards for the first touch down. Pike kicking goal.

The second score followed after Ohnick's long run, Pike going over on a line buck. Pike kicked goal again, and the score was ended 12 to 0.

Niles, the star punter from Salem, suffered a broken rib and a sprained ankle in the latter part of the game, and Holman took his place and Belling displaced Savage, who was not well when he entered the game. Lincoln's only change was when Smith went in at guard in place of Sparger.

Lincoln made much ground with the forward pass, while Salem's best work was around the ends. The visitors had a few good tricks, but Lincoln fathomed them before they netted much ground.

Inability to pay expenses has caused Salem to cancel the return game which was to be played by Lincoln next Saturday, and the date is open on the Lincoln schedule.

He played about three minutes and Belling was substituted.
