

IT DON'T COST MUCH

Says Any One Can Prepare the Mixture, and Knows Nothing Better to Take

Opposes the Charter.

Editor Journal:—Please note in your paper the purport of section 8, in the proposed new charter. In my opinion Secs. 8 and 9 should not be allowed to remain in the charter, as they are written. No city can possibly escape from paying damages for the negligence of its servants and the city owning the streets from property line to property line they can't compel the property owners to repair or pay damages that accrue on somebody's property that they do not own which would be unjust, and I believe would not stand in any court of justice. The street and alleys belong to everybody and their use is free to everybody, and all improvement thereon should be borne by the whole city. Therefore section 8 in the new charter is wrong, and should be left out. Rather than see that part indorsed I would vote against the whole charter.

The mayor has too much power granted him, especially in appointing the three commissioners, who should have charge of all the different departments, and transact all of the business of the city without the consent or approval of the council; they should be elective, and should have reasonable salaries for their services. The city cannot ask men to work for nothing, and thereby offer a premium for graft, which they are bound to do, in order to recompense themselves for their time and necessary expenses. Further no franchise should be granted by council or commission to any street or electric or steam railroad to use the public streets of the city without first furnishing an amount of the route or course such road asks for. With the amount of the remuneration the city shall receive for the same to the qualified voters of the city for their sanction or rejection. The streets belong to the people not to the mayor, council or commissioners. Further section 220 to, and including section 228, simply confiscate property by making the terms of the appeal, such that the cost, and rules of procedure are an outrage upon any citizen so aggrieved.

Further, to pass section 251 would be in my opinion a heinous crime against the citizens of Salem. Now, Mr. Editor, I have asked a great many of the citizens on the streets if they have seen a copy of the proposed new charter, and only about one in twenty have had a chance to see it. I would advise the citizens to obtain a copy, at once, and become familiar with it before voting on it, and get out, and register, and vote intelligently on so important a matter.

CHEMICAL ENGINE A SUCCESS

Final Test Made Yesterday Afternoon of Big Fire Extinguisher at State House.

The final test of the new chemical engine which was installed recently at the state house was made yesterday afternoon and proved even more successful than had been expected by the state authorities. The power of the engine was demonstrated by A. G. Long, of the engine works in Portland, and R. R. Shawcross, an expert employe of the company. The test was made before Governor Chamberlain and Alderman Lowe, of Salem. The first test was made from a point about midway of the dome where Governor Chamberlain pulled the string which released the engine and sent a stream of water through 175 feet of hose for a distance of 50 feet from the nozzle.

After the engine had thrown the column of water and gas for ten minutes the party descended to the basement where the engine is located and while the hose in the dome was still in operation a second stream was turned on from the engine room. The water was thrown from the lower pipe 60 or 70 feet from the nozzle. The test occupied at least one-half hour and was completed without a break or leak in the pipes and to the satisfaction of all who were present.

The state house force was then used. The capacity of the engine and given full instructions as to its use. The capacity of the engine is 500 gallons and its charge consists of 500 gallons of water, 200 pounds of English bicarbonate of soda and 100 pounds of sulphuric acid.

The bicarbonate of soda is put into a solution of water and as the form of carbonic gas is globular, myriads of these are in suspension in the water. The sulphuric acid contained in 3 lead receptacles each being encased in a copper sheath, having a glass top into which fits a conical lead cork.

The engine is operated from any one of eight stations or boxes which are distributed through the building by breaking a glass in the front of the box and pulling a cord. The cable thus pulled is connected with a trap which release two heavy weights connected with the engine cylinder which causes the cylinder to revolve. The effect of this is to release the lead corks above referred to, allowing the gas to escape from the tanks and mix with the alkaline water. The acid coming in contact with the carbonic globules causes them to burst thus releasing the carbonic gas, the expansive force of which creates the pressure which expels the contents of the cylinder through the pipe system and the hose.

The carbonic gas coming from the stream is the fire extinguishing power. The weight of the engine cylinder is 3600 pounds. The fire boxes are situated so that every foot of the building can be reached and the bronze cable which connects the engine to the boxes is encased in three-quarter inch pipe, thus protecting it from rust or other damage.

The pipe system through which the fluid is conducted is one and one-half inches in diameter and is of galvanized iron with long sweep elbows to reduce friction. It is claimed by Mr. Long, the proprietor of the engine factory, that the cylinder will support a continuous stream for one-half hour which is sufficient time to extinguish any fire if rightly handled.
