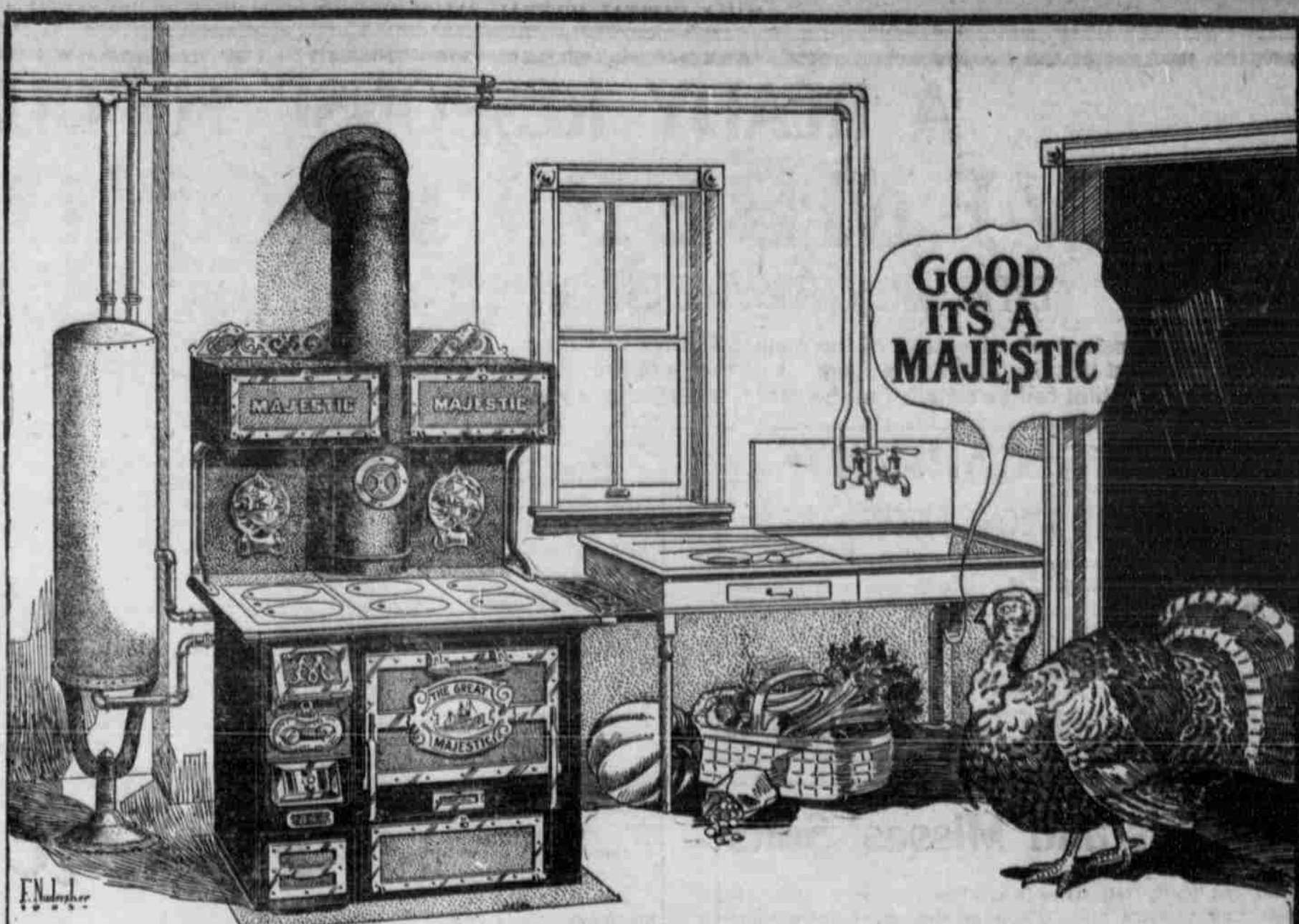

It is painful to realize that the Salem press has lost its manhood. To lose the last shred of its manhood and nothing doing to get it restored is tough on the whole community. The editors must have both been out of town when that North Commercial street narrow-gauge viaduct was incubated for it certainly is not wide enough to let anyone pass over it having on a very big jag of manhood.
