WILL WOOD PRICES COME DOWN?

Anticipation of a reduction in the prices of wood everywhere are created by the announcement from Lewiston of a drop in that city from \$10 a cord to \$8.75.

The mildness of the present fall season and the knowledge that immense quantities of wood are piled up in the country give additional foundation for the hope entertained by consumers that there will be a material lowering of the present high prices.

The restrictions which people are placing on their consumption of various articles, as a result of the financial flurry, is noticeable in the matter of fuel and if the natural law of supply and demand holds good the result would seem to be that wood prices must come down to where they should be.

Notwithstanding the explanations given by dealers as to labor, car shortage, etc., the public has never been convinced that there was reasonable excuse for the high prices charged.

If the root of the troubles lies among the farmers and contractors at the original sources of supply, they must learn that their demands constitute a form of extortion that can not prevail much longer.

Indications now are that the supply in sight is considerably in excess of the probable demand during the coming winter, and that with a mild winter and a growing use of coal a large quantity of wood may remain over into next summer.

CENTRAL AMERICAN PEACE.

At the friendly suggestion of the United States and Mexico, the Central American republics are now holding a peace conference at Washington for the purpose of reaching an agreement that will put an end to the waging of petty wars against each other.

The Central American republics have what has been called the INSURRECTIONARY HABIT.

The character of the people cannot be changed instantly with an international agreement, but influences may be brought to bear that will reduce the number of occasions for an insurrection.

If the five republics represented can reach an agreement to PREVENT THE POWER AND INFLUENCE AND MONEY OF ONE FROM BEING USED TO FOMENT TROUBLE IN ANOTHER, there is reason to believe the number of insurrections, as well as the number of wars between themselves, will be reduced.

The last notable war in Central America was traced to the theft of a mule.

The mule was not the immediate and declared cause, but the complications that resulted in the war were traced to the stolen mule.

The republics are now at peace and their representatives are trying to devise an effective method of maintaining this condition, assisted by the state department of the United States and the minister from Mexico to the United States.

How to devise a method of making any agreement effective is the chief difficulty.

While there is probably no effective way of binding one nation not to make war on another, an agreement entered into at a peace conference will be a potent restraint.

Secretary Root, who is the particular friend of the Central and South American republics because of the interest he has taken in their affairs and because of his visits to the republics to the south of us, understands the difficulties of the situation.

As temporary chairman at the opening of the peace conference ten days ago, he said THE ALL-IMPORTANT THING WAS TO DEVISE SOME PRACTICAL METHOD UNDER WHICH IT WILL BE POSSIBLE TO SECURE THE PERFORMANCE OF AGREEMENTS.

In his opinion, the peace conference should make it somebody's duty to see that the "great principles you declare are not violated" and to see that, if an attempt be made to violate them, "the responsibility may be fixed upon the guilty individual."

That is no doubt the chief problem of the conference.

There is no question or claim now pending among the republics and the way is clear for doing all that can be done to afford greater stability to the governments and greater security to life and property.

The river at noon today had reached the 12½-foot mark and was rising very fast. The river is full of logs and drift and some damage will probably result to bridges owing to the flood.

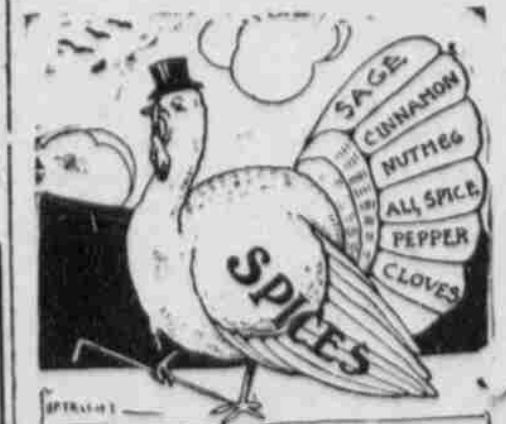
It is reported that 600 ties which were cut near Mehama floated into the Santiam, but most of them have been captured.
