WHAT HAS BEEN DONE TO PROTECT THE STATE AGAINST LOSS OF FUNDS DEPOSITED IN THE PORTLAND BANKS.

The attorney general and the secretary of state of Oregon are Republican officials while the governor is a Democrat, and ALL SEEM TO BE DOING ALL IN THEIR POWER to protect the people against loss in the suspended Portland banks.

The state had the sum of \$35,000 in the Oregon Trust and Savings that closed several months ago, and the American Surety company HAS REPAYED THAT AMOUNT TO THE STATE TREASURER.

The surety company act on the principle that it was a just claim, and its officers will do the investigating afterwards.

The same Surety company also paid Linn county the sum of \$10,000 SCHOOL FUNDS HELD BY THAT COUNTY IN THE SAME BANK.

The Title Guaranty Trust company took out two bonds with the same company in amount of \$50,000 each, to protect the state for sums left in that bank by the state treasurer.

The Surety company will probably pay those as soon as it appears that the state will be deprived of the use of its money if it does not. IT WILL INVESTIGATE AFTERWARDS.

The state treasurer also has a bond with the same company for \$40,000 to protect the state for the balance of \$12,478.20 that was in the Merchants National when it closed the other day.

The Surety company will probably pay this amount AS A JUST CLAIM DUE THE STATE and investigate afterwards.

The exact sums which State Treasurer Steel had in the Title Guaranty Trust company bank were: General fund \$47,483.41, interest \$40.56; demand certificates of deposit \$60,000, educational funds \$228,426.27—TOTAL IN THAT BANK WHEN IT CLOSED \$395,991.24.

For this amount the state holds \$600,000 bonds of the American Surety company of New York.

The state treasurer is not being considered in this summing up of what is being done to protect the state, but it must be said that he has \$500,000 in the shape of NOTES SECURED BY MORTGAGES ON TIMBER LANDS.

This was the additional collateral he demanded and which was given him after the bank got into trouble. But the First National bank of Portland has \$150,000 prior claim against this security.

Besides, the right of the state treasurer to this collateral WILL BE QUESTIONED BY THE OTHER CREDITORS OF THE BANK.

The three state officials above mentioned are all disposed to do their duty in the premises and collect the money that belongs to the state without fear or favor.

The present indications are that the American Surety company will come through AND MAKE GOOD ALL THAT THE STATE TREASURER PLACED IN THE PORTLAND BANKS.

If the Surety company does that, and treats the losses of the state in suspended banks as just claims, the state funds will be made good without litigation by the state.

But the state will have to fight if the Surety company undertakes to treat the acts of the state treasurer as unlawful. THE STATE OFFICIALS ARE PREPARED TO PUT UP A WINNING FIGHT IN THAT CASE.

It is assumed that the state treasurer has done all in his power to protect the state, and that he will continue to do so.

If the three state officials who represent the people act as an unit in protecting the people against losses, there can be NO CHARGE OF PLAYING POLITICS IN THE WHOLE SITUATION.

If those three officials find they cannot secure the state funds without bringing a suit, and cannot bring a suit without asking the treasurer to resign, they will probably unite and ask him to resign.

The Republican secretary of State is joining the Democratic governor in loaning the state school funds JUST AS THOUGH THEY WERE IN THE HANDS OF THE TREASURER.

The Republican attorney general has served notice on the banks at Portland, on their receivers, and on the Surety company, demanding the production of the funds.

That official has done his full duty in taking all the legal steps to prevent the state from losing any of its funds BY ANY TECHNICAL DEFENSES THAT MAY BE SET UP FOR THE TREASURER OR SURETY COMPANY.

So far nothing apparently has been left undone to protect the state and the officials who have done this deserve credit for performing their duty.

SEMI-BARBARIC CUSTOM.

Greek Section Crew at Pendleton Brutally Kill Animals According to Pagan Rite.

What is perhaps the most ghoulish and semi-barbaric rite ever performed in Umatilla county, has just been carried out by a gang of Greeks employed on the O. R. & N. grade work near this city. About half of the Greeks and Sicilians employed in the United States are pagans and practice the old pagan rites which have been in vogue in parts of southern Europe for many centuries. One of these rites forbids the Greek to eat flesh which was killed by a person not of their belief, and consequently the meat purchased by this peculiar cult is all live meat and includes sheep and fowls principally.

A sheep was made the victim of their pagan rites near this city recently and for ghoulish cruelty and ignorance its slaughter perhaps surpasses anything which has ever come to the notice of the general public.

A live sheep was purchased by the Greeks and taken to their cook car, where it was "hog tied," that is, its four legs were tied together closely and the animal was hung up to the roof of the car by a stick thrust under its tied legs.

There it was allowed to hang, head down, for three or four days until it died from the ordeal. Each day the Greek cook or leader of the gang, would go through a performance of killing the suffering animal. A long knife would be sharpened, the cook would roll up his sleeves and every detail of the slaughter would be performed, excepting the act of killing the sheep.

Finally when it was seen that the animal was dying the gang assembled around the sheep, once more the knife was sharpened and with a flourish the throat of the helpless animal was cut as its life was passing away from starvation and punishment.

In explanation the leader of this gang said the sheep's flesh was more palatable if it was allowed to die in this way and that it was a custom in their home in Greece to slaughter all sheep in this manner.—East Oregonian.
