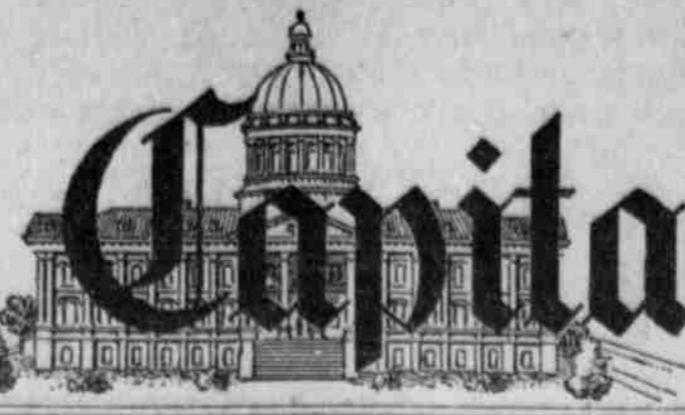

#### Proofs of Naturalization Qualifications to Be Investigated in Oregon

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 28.—John Speed Smith, Herbert W. Meyers, Edwin Ashbaugh and R. S. McCall, who will assist District Attorney Andrew J. Balliet in naturalization work in Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana, have arrived from Washington, D. C. Organizing the office force will begin tomorrow, and after a few days the task of examining the applicants for naturalization in the district started. The systematic investigation of the proofs offered by applicants for naturalization papers is somewhat new. The country has been divided into large districts, and the investigation is placed in the hands of assistant United States district attorneys.

### JOHN D. WOULD BE SHYLOCK

#### Said to Have Offered 75 Per Cent On New York City Bonds

New York, Nov. 28.—At the darkest hour of the panic, when a score of banking institutions were on the edge of failure, John D. Rockefeller helped stem the tide by announcing that he would throw his vast wealth into the breach. The day after Rockefeller's announcement a small, but solvent banking institution was hard pressed for cash. It had plenty of good securities, but could not get cash.

Hearing of Rockefeller's offer of aid, the directors went to him and offered a large block of New York City bonds, providing he would give them cash. Rockefeller offered to give them cash for the bonds, provided he got them at a discount of no less than 25 per cent from the market price. To lend only 75 per cent on New York City bonds, even at such a time, would have been a peculiarly shrewd transaction.

#### Saloon Men Would Stop All Wheels of Industry On Sabbath

Chicago, Nov. 28.—The Chicago saloon keepers, face to face with a desperate legal battle which threatens to compel them to close their places on Sunday, have dragged from the dusty statutes an old-time bill passed in 1845. Under the drastic provisions of this law they threaten to shut up Chicago tighter than a drum. Under the law, if the saloon men succeed in enforcing it, it will be impossible to issue Sunday newspapers. The theatres must be closed, as well as other places of amusement. No street cars must run. No places of business except barber shops may remain open.
