Funeral of Mrs. E. M. Waite.
The funeral of the late Mrs. Louisa M. Waite took place from the home of the deceased at 2 o'clock Wednesday, and the very impressive services were conducted by P. S. Knight, of the Congregational church. Mrs. Waite died Tuesday morning after a short illness of three weeks, from the effects of which on account of her great age she was unable to rally. She lived to be over 84 years and was always of a cheerful disposition and very active, it being but a short time since she was moving among her friends on the street and making calls on relatives. She was born in Germany, and followed her brothers, the Breyman to Oregon, reaching Portland in 1859, where she taught music, having received a fine musical and literary education in her youth. For a number of years Mrs. Waite was a teacher in Willamette University. Her residence at Salem dates from 1860, and it was here she met and married E. M. Waite, one of the prominent citizens of the state.

Mrs. Waite leaves no children and her husband died some years ago. Two sisters are living, Mrs. Bertha Soebst in Germany, and Alberta Bartels of Portland. Three brothers

survive her, Arthur and August Breyman of Portland, and Werner Breyman of Salem, all prominent and successful citizens.

The funeral was conducted from the old home of Mr. and Mrs. Waite and was attended by the many friends they had so often greeted and entertained beneath its roof. The rooms were thrown open as they have been on so many occasions, decked with flowers, and the casket was covered with beautiful memorial gifts. The piano stood open as she had left it, an instrument at which she was unusually proficient and entertained herself and friends by the hour. And those friends who had known and loved her—pioneers and professional men and women included Mrs. Waite in their circle—the most upright and respected class of citizens respected Mrs. Waite for her intelligence and independence of character—those friends were out in large numbers to pay the last sad tribute of respect to her memory in a public way.

The funeral service consisted of singing by a quartet composed of Messrs. Deckabach and McGilchrist, and Mrs. Carleton Smith and Mrs. Francesco Seeley. They sang "Nearer My God to Thee," "Lead Kindly Light," and "Peace, Perfect Peace." Rev. Knight read from the scriptures and offered prayer with some very appropriate remarks from the text: "We look not upon the things which are seen, but on the things which are unseen, for the things which are seen are temporal, but the things which are unseen are eternal." The bearer of the pall were old friends of the deceased and her husband: J. W. Roland, P. H. D'Arcy, A. N. Moores, C. B. Moores and G. H. Burnett. Burial was by the side of her husband at Rural cemetery.

Mrs. Waite will be very much missed in this community where she has practically lived all her life. In social circles where she was familiar and intimate her place can never be filled. Few persons had the brilliant conversational powers she possessed or employed them in more charming manner. She was a woman of remarkable intellectual powers and gifted in many ways.
