Great Musical Production.
In all the daintiness and niceness
of her "Marrying Mary" clever Marie
Cahill has scored a signal triumph
and will be seen here at the Grand,
December 5. They who have called
for more story and more plot in
musical plays have been vindicated
in this most interesting effort of Ed-
win Milton Royle, and the music by
Silvio Hein and lyrics by Benjamin
Hapgood Bart, have proved a most
fitting decoration to the book.

"Marrying Mary" is really a great
musical play for it marked the crea-
tion of a new class of entertainment.
The English musical comedies have
already been characterized as nice,
but then they have invariably been
too dull for Americans. But here
we have a comedy free from horse
play and vulgarity, and yet most
lively and entertaining. "Comedy of
the mind and not of the hands and
feet" someone has said, and it seems
fit, provided the phrase is not so in-
terpreted as to exclude the graceful
dancing of the "long-skirted" chorus
and even of Marie Cahill herself.
For the first time since she suffered
an accident to her hip a number of
years ago, Miss Cahill has ventured
to dance, and in "Mr. Cupid" she
displays all the grace and art which
made her known in Augustin Daly's
"Runaway Girl" as the best dancer
on the American stage.

A secret of Miss Cahill's success
lies in the remarkable and strong
cast she has gathered together. It
is probably the highest priced and
most finished aggregation of players
now appearing in a musical comedy.
Eugene Cowles alone must command
a salary which would stagger any
manager.



Swedish Portrayal.

A Swedish dialect comedy in which
the action of the story is made to re-
volve about the person of a bright
and witty young Swedish girl would
seem to promise a maximum measure
of entertainment. The play,
"Tilly Olson," which will be present-
ed at the Grand opera house next
Monday is accepted as one of the
best dramas of its class that has yet
been shown. The only Swedish char-
acter in it is Tilly Olson, but her
ready wit and resourceful spirit
dominate the action of the story.
The rest of the characters are pro-
ducts of the great northwest, the
scene being laid first on a Minnesota
farm and later in the city of Minne-
apolis. "Tilly" proves to be a very
entertaining stage creation, for she
is bright and witty and with a fund
of good humor hid beneath the im-
perturbability for which her nation
is noted. The situations of the play
are said to be extremely amusing and
the comedy is clean cut and scintillat-
ing with good things from beginning
to end. Some original specialties
are introduced and a fine quartette
is carried for the church scene. An
adequate scenic equipment has been
provided, every scene being from the
studio of Messrs. Moses & Hamilton
of the Broadway theater, New York.
An exceptionally clever company will
aid in interpreting the comedy and
the title role will be played by an
especially clever comedienne, Miss
Aimee Commons. Another prominent
member of the cast is Master Jack
Rollins, one of the most talented
young actors of the times.

Theatrical Notes.

Mary Emerson, in "On Parole,"

theater-going public want what they
want, when they want it, and it
would appear that "Simple Simon
Simple" just about fills the bill.

the nimble-footed character comedi-

Frank Deshon, has certainly added
a laughing spell to Willard Spencer's
"Miss Bob White," by her interpre-
tation of the role of Maggie, which
has heretofore been played as the
prettiest girl of the outfit. Miss Mac's
impersonation is a cross between
Sis Hopkins and Cinthy in "Check-
ers," and is a veritable scream from
the moment she makes her appear-
ance.

Pittsburg will be a scene of activ-
ity during the coming week, as the
Ohio Circuit Theatrical company will
hold their annual meeting there, and
all the big theatrical men of the
country will be there.

"The Mayor of Laughland," the
musical fun play in which Messrs.

seven inch man, and a capable com-
pany of mirth-provokers, has just
finished an extended tour of Canada.
The Philadelphia firm are in receipt

offering first choice of dates for the
year to come, which, considering the
stolid indifference of our English
cousins, is a remarkable tribute to
