"Tilly Olson."

One of the most amusing and di-

recting comedies of the season is

the clever Swedish dialect drama

"Tilly Olson," if all reports are to

be believed. It will be seen in this city

at the Grand opera house next

Monday night. "Yon Yonson" proved to be one of the most successful comedies ever written, and "Tilly Olson" is said to be written better than "Yon Yonson." In the new play the central character, instead of a man, is a young Swedish girl—a sort of Scandinavian Sis Hopkins. She is first discovered as a "bound girl" in a family of Minnesota farmer people, but through persecution is forced to leave and seek her fortune elsewhere. She makes the city of Minneapolis her Mecca and there finds employment and later distinguishes herself by preventing the robbery of a bank and receiving from the officials in recognition of services a check large enough to enable her to marry the man of her choice and settle down on a modest farm. The simple story of the plot does not afford an inkling of the comedy that is brought out by the author. "Tilly" has been made a most charming and ingenious character, full of dry humor and suppressed mirth characteristic of the Swedish nature. The play is in four acts and eight scenes and a fine scenic production has been gotten up by Messrs. Moses and Hamilton, the scenic artists of the Broadway theater, New York. If the playgoer has seen "Yon Yonson," he will certainly want to see "Tilly Olson." Almee Common, a talented and charming comedienne, will assume the role of the fair-haired maiden of Scandinavia, and the company will be wholly capable to meet the requirements of the play.

At the Klinger Grand.
