**WANT TO AMEND**  
**TITLE OF BILL.**  
Counsel Bingham and Winslow desire to amend the title of the bill that has been prepared by the attorney-general for the referendum on the University appropriation bill. As prepared to go on the ballot it reads, a bill for an act "increasing the annual appropriation for the support and maintenance of the University of Oregon from \$47,5000 to \$125,000." The counsel of the state University asks to have the title go upon the official ballot as follows: "For an act fixing the annual appropriation for the support and maintenance of the University of Oregon at \$125,000 per annum." This will get rid of the objection that the proposed increase would be shown in specific amounts on the referendum ballot, and might help defeat the bill. The matter is to be heard by the supreme court.
