## THE FIGHT FOR OPENING THE WILLAMETTE.

That this magnificent river shall be made navigable without toll or tax from the upper valley to the sea has been the dream of interior western Oregon for generations.

From Eugene to the mouth of the Columbia there has been a constant demand for the unlocking of the treasures of WATER NAVIGATION THE YEAR AROUND FOR BOTH PRODUCER AND CONSUMER.

One of the greatest steps to bring this about has been taken in the passage of the bill through the legislature by which the state undertakes to help to the amount of \$300,000.

To be sure this is to be spent only on the acquisition of free locks and canal, and their maintenance by the general government, but that is the lock THE UNLOCKING OF WHICH UNLOCKS THE WHOLE RIVER.

Without free locks and canal the river will not be of much use for the cheaper and heavier classes of freight cannot afford to pay the tonnage of 50 cents per ton now collected for lockage.

The war department will be asked to have new estimates made, based on the report of the board of engineers made in 1901, as to the probable cost of ACQUIRING AND REPAIRING THE LOCKS AT PRESENT PRICES OF LABOR.

Upon that report congress will act, and the disposition of the war department seems to be to treat the matter as settled that the general government should acquire the locks and canal.

Congressman Hawley has already introduced a bill to appropriate \$300,000 to buy the locks and canal from the corporation that now owns them and WILL PUSH THE MEASURE HARD.

The Oregon delegation has consented to take up this measure for the relief of the shippers of western Oregon, and make it among the first bills that will receive consideration.

It is not known whether a rivers and harbor bill will be passed at this session or not, but if there is the Willamette river projects will receive THE GREATEST AMOUNT OF ATTENTION that has ever been given them in the history of such legislation.

## VAIN IMAGININGS ABOUT "JAPAN."

We extend our condolences to the mikado of Japan in view of the disastrous time which he is undoubtedly having in dealing with the yellow press within his dominions, aided,abetted, inspired and incited by the yellow press of the United States, the evident object of both being to make trouble between the two countries.

The President's message is silent in respect to Oriental immigration, possibly from a fear that what he might write now would not correspond with what he wrote a year ago; and the Japanese government has asked Ambassador Aoki to come home for consultation or removal, as the case may be.

It is a very common occurrence for ambassadors to visit their home officers, and it should not be regarded as remarkable for a President—and even for President Roosevelt—to be silent in respect to a subject ABOUT WHICH THERE IS NOTHING TO SAY.

Nevertheless, the yellow journals in all manner of weird imaginings of impending trouble.

According to one, the slump in securities in Wall street is due to suspicions of impending war, whose first effect would be to make business for the properties which the securities represent.

According to another, Ambassador Aoki is getting the sack because he was unable to keep the battle-ship fleet in the Atlantic, where it would be impossible for it, at any reasonable expense, to accept this kind invitation of the Japanese government to make a friendly visit to Japanese waters.

Now, as a matter of fact, NOBODY KNOWS WHY THE JAPANESE GOVERNMENT DESIRED TO SEE EMBASSADOR AOKI, AND IT IS AT ANY RATE NONE OF OUR BUSINESS.

As to Oriental immigration, the cranes are that nothing whatever is doing in any diplomatic way.

But whether there is or not, we are not likely to be informed. It is becoming sufficiently evident that no part of North America will continue to allow the unrestricted immigration of Oriental coolies.

The Japanese government has made it plain that so far as Japanese are concerned IT WOULD LIKE TO BE PERMITTED TO REGULATE THE MATTER FROM THAT END, AND MOST PEOPLE IN THE UNITED STATES ARE WILLING TO EXTEND THAT COURTESY BY DELAYING THE ENACTMENT OF DOMESTIC LAW ON THE SUBJECT UNTIL IT SHALL NOT HAVE THE APPEARANCE OF BEING AIMED PARTICULARLY AT JAPANESE.

That we suppose to be the status of the subject, the speculations of yellow journalists being nothing but the offspring of a diseased imagination.

federal court yesterday, and so ended the trial of Harry T. Wilson, formerly messenger of the First National bank of this city, who was accused of stealing \$2000 entrusted to him. Wilson's mother, 90 years old, white-haired, black-robed, arose in court and, her seamed and careworn face wreathed in smiles, staggered toward Hugh Gordon Miller, the lawyer who successfully defended her son. Old Mrs. Wilson had been a pitiful figure during the five days' trial. She sat behind her son, gowned in rusty black, and her white hair covered with a veiled widow's cap, which she has worn, she says, for more than 20 years. Not once throughout the trial had she smiled, her wrinkled face reflecting only too plainly a mother's anguish as she saw her only son and support facing possible imprisonment as a felon. So deaf is the old lady that she did not hear a word when the foreman of the jury announced her son's freedom. But one glance sufficed for her still sharp eyes to read the verdict in the faces of Judge Chatfield and others. For a second she paled, and then, with a trembling hand she seized those of Mr. Miller, who for four hours had charmed the jury and listeners with a flood of rhetoric and a typical southern appeal for the son. The attorney led her to a chair, but the old mother wanted no rest. She embraced her son and, bewildered with joy, started to leave the court room by the judge's private door. United States Marshal Henkel put his

arm about her and led her gently out to the corridor. There she insisted upon thanking even strangers passing, who had not the least idea of the cause of her joy. In the meantime Wilson, who had been stolid, broke down and wept until his friends gathered around him and congratulated him warmly.

## AFTERMATH OF CASTEL TRAGEDY

Sheriff Culver is in receipt of letters which prove conclusively that Henry Castel, who was the husband of the late Mrs. Castel, who was murdered at Macleay, is dead, which kills the theory that he committed the awful crime. A letter has been received from Matthew Park, of St. Louis, Mo., a brother-in-law of Mrs. Castel, stating that Mr. Castel died about five years ago at Detroit, Mich. Mr. Park said that he was acquainted with Montgomery, who had lived with the Castel family many years, and knew him to be a man of pleasant address when in good humor, but possessed an almost uncontrollable temper when angry. This letter was corroborated by communications from Dr. A. W. Foreman, of Whitehall, Ill., the family physician of the Castels, and who knew Mrs. Castel since she was a child. Castel's brother, in Portland, also wrote Sheriff Culver that his brother died about five years ago, which date was approximately fixed for the death by another resident of Whitehall, besides Dr. Foreman.

Philip G. Rice, to whom Martha Castel was engaged, wrote to Sheriff Culver, after returning to his home at Myrtle Creek, that he had learned from residents there that Montgomery had expressed his objections to the marriage, and had said that he intended to make it his business to see that the wedding never took place. It is reported by citizens of Whitehall that Montgomery had the reputation of having killed two men in Kentucky before coming to Illinois, but that he claimed that he killed them in self-defense.

While the facts of the murder and the details of the horrible crime probably took flight with the lives of the Castels and their brutal slayer, whose bodies were consumed by the flames, being woven around Montgomery, from which an imaginative mind can picture the crazed man in jealous rage doing his bloody work—rushing out of the building with either the intention of making his escape or blowing out his brains with the shot gun which was found near the house, and, either lacking the nerve, or realizing how hopeless would be his efforts to escape, he turned back to the house, throwing away his hat, purse and gun, and, after setting fire to the building, cut his own throat and ended it all.

Mrs. Castel and her son attended church on the last day of their lives, and it has been suggested that while away Montgomery had demanded of the girl that she should not marry Rice, and when the mother and brother returned that Sunday evening this trouble ended in the awful climax. And it is the theory of some that Mrs. Castel might never have seen her mother and brother after they left for the house of God that Sunday morning.
