Peruzzi, vice president of the Oregon State Dairy association, and manager of the Ashland creamery, presiding the meeting, Mr. Peruzzi is interested in the dairy industry of this state and speaks encouragingly of its future.

The most remarkable thing about Oregon," said Mr. Peruzzi yesterday, "is the immigration within the last two years of farmers from the north and Iowa states which are throughout the country for dairying, and these men have brought with them the modern dairy methods which characterize those regions.

The effect on land values has been marked that land which used to be worth \$10 an acre is now worth \$35 an acre, and in Jackson county alone, owned by the assessor's books, \$1,000,000 greater than last year.

Where three years ago five dairymen were eking out an existence on certain territory, 15 are now engaged in a splendid living.

The products of the dairy industry in southern Oregon this year have increased 30 per cent over last year. Our part of the state is transformed from a stock-raising region to a dairying region.

State and Williams valleys, that were given over to stock-raising exclusively, in the past two years the farmers have established dairies and nearly all of them are milking from 4 to 10 cows and deriving a splendid revenue therefrom.

The increase in land value from \$35 to \$100 is in direct ratio to the earnings brought about by dairying over those received from stock-raising."

A "Panic Day" in Wall Street.

In the arena itself are none of the scenes that one might expect when men see the fortunes of a score of years leave their grasp in perhaps an hour. It is a fine display of that nerve which the true American possesses. If anything is needed to prove the stage that he is "a good loser," a "panic" day in Wall street is proof enough.

Again look over the floor. There is a man strutting up and down, hands in pockets, apparently as unconcerned as if pacing the lobby of the hotel with his after-dinner cigar. Over in a corner are two others talking together. They are not smiling, but they might be discussing a mere trifle, to judge by their calm attitude. The messenger-boys, who seem to be about as numerous as the brokers, go from place to place with the same mechanical precision as if it were a hundred-thousand share day in midsummer, and everybody gone to the ball game or into the country. The men at the posts have no time to go out for luncheon, but munch an apple or a sandwich, selling or buying a thousand dollars at a bite.

It is a game with millions in the balance, but no men ever sat around a poker table and played for a 25-cent corder with less excitement than most of those to whom the toss of a hand in this place may mean the gain or loss of ten thousand for their patrons.

They call this a "panic" day because twelve stocks alone had sold, when the day was over, at ten points less than when it began, and because the two and a half million shares of stock that had changed ownership during the five hours were worth \$25,000,000 less than when the market opened.

PROMINENT NEWBERG CITIZEN

Asks That Voters Be Given a Fair Chance to Know What Is Put on the Official Ballot.

Newberg, Or., Dec. 10, 1907. Editor Capital Journal:—In a Salem daily paper of December 7, W. C. Winslow takes exception to the wording for the ballots for the June election, as prepared by Attorney General Crawford, referring to the referendum vote on the appropriation for the University of Oregon, as misleading and has filed a suit in the circuit court to have the wording changed. I believe there is no one better prepared to make the correct wording than Attorney General Crawford. His wording is "For an act increasing the annual appropriation for the support and maintenance of the University of Oregon from \$47,500 to \$125,000."

Mr. Winslow wants the wording changed to read as follows: "For an act fixing the annual appropriation for the support and maintenance of the University of Oregon at \$125,000 per annum. Mr. Winslow does not wish the voters to know how much of an increase they are asking for. He does not want the people to know that the new appropriation is more than two and one half times greater than the old, while the amount of the old appropriation is more than double that used by several of the independent colleges of the state. Some of which turn out as much or more and equally as good if not better work than the University of Oregon on an expenditure of less than

\$25,000 a year. I believe the wording ought to stand as Attorney General Crawford has it, and I think I voice the sentiment of nine-tenths of the voters of Yamhill county. If Judge Galloway changes the wording I think he will make a mistake. All we ask is a chance for an intelligent vote and then abide by the decision.

GROWS VEGETABLES IN ALASKA

Remarkable Crop Raised on Farm of Three Acres Near Fairbanks.

Seattle, Nov. 27.—If the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition which will be held in Seattle in 1909 should offer a prize for the best plot of ground under cultivation in Alaska or Yukon, Fred Gerhardt of Fairbanks, who has recently sent to the exposition management details of the crop gathered from his three acres, would stand a good chance of winning honorable mention.

Indeed it is doubtful if Pacific coast farmers who have the advantage of being three thousand miles nearer the equator, could better Gerhardt's record. On his three acres outside of Fairbanks last summer he grew ten tons of turnips, four tons of rutabagas, 8000 heads of celery, five tons of cabbages and several dozen tons of mixed vegetables including carrots, beets, lettuce, radishes, tomatoes, parsnips, mushrooms and cucumbers.

Gerhardt will make some six to eight thousand dollars clear off his three acres, and there are many Alaskan miners who have not done so well this season. The Alaskan-Yukon-Pacific exposition will demonstrate through exhibits from farms such as Gerhardt's that gold is not the only wealth that can be gathered out of the ground of the country of the circle.
