TEACH CHILDREN HONESTY.

At this season of the year there is always complaint of petty robberies by children from the toy stores—tempting little things that a boy can slip in his pocket unnoticed while walking through the departments and along the great heaps and spread of things on the counters.

This has become noticeable from year to year and on Saturday several bad cases were reported to the police.

ONE INSTANCE WAS THAT OF THE SON OF A PROMINENT SALEM CITIZEN.

The boy was about 12 years old, and several years ago the same boy was caught taking things from the same store.

Just what to do with such boys is the question, but it is probably NECESSARY TO MAKE AN EXAMPLE OF SOME OF THEM.

They will be marched up to the police judge and pay a fine, and there will be great chagrin in the family of the aforesaid boy's parents.

But the parents have themselves to blame in most cases, although there are children who seem to have a slant look out of the corner of their eyes THAT BETOKEN MISCHIEF ON OTHER LINES.

But parents would help matters by not being too stingy with their children.

Children see other children have marbles and toys, air guns, jack-knives and knick-knacks.

Unable to get what they desire with money, the parents giving them no money whatever THE CHILD CANNOT RESIST THE TEMPTATION to take the very articles spread out so alluringly and handled by the crowds in the holiday stores.

Thus the foundations of dishonesty are laid by the neglect of the parents to teach the children the principles of property, that money can alone give title to things, AND THAT IT IS SHAMEFUL AND DISGRACEFUL TO GET THINGS WITHOUT PAYING FOR THEM OR EARNING THEM.

Better give the boy or girl a little money once in a while and let them learn to spend it in their own way.

IT IS CHEAPER IN THE LONG RUN.

Some parents put in three-fourths of their time telling children what not to do, what not to desire, denying them this and forbidding them that, until the boy or girl looks upon the parents as the incarnation of restraint and prohibition, denying every joy that springs naturally in the breast of childhood.

AND THAT IS THE WAY CRIMINALS ARE MADE.

One Salem store lost six dollars worth of articles taken off its counters in one day and there is no remedy for this but to employ a floor walker, and this is what most of the stores do to prevent shoplifting.

CHILDREN ARE NOT THE ONLY OFFENDERS.

In one educational institution one young lady was very expert in fancy needle work, and her services were in great demand showing others how to do various kinds of fancy work.

She was soon surprised at the abundance of laces and trimmings brought her by the younger girls, many of which she recognized as never having been bought, BUT LITERALLY "SWIPED" FROM THE COUNTERS OF MERCHANTS THROUGHOUT THE CITY.

The necessity of teaching fundamental honesty and morality in the schools is becoming very apparent, as too many parents utterly neglect to teach these cardinal virtues at home and probably set bad examples in taking things and making money and getting property by short-cut methods, WHICH THE CHILDREN IMITATE IN SMALLER WAYS and thus lay the foundation for future and increasing dishonesty and criminality.

There are probably in all cities thousands of cases of pilfering of the holiday counters, and certainly the attractions and temptations at Salem are great this year.

NEEDS A RAILROAD.

Section That Would Furnish an Abundance of Traffic.

Sidney, Dec. 14, 1907. Editor Journal: We think it not amiss to say a word about the merit of this section for a railroad; both as to the natural location for an easy roadbed and as supplying an outlet for a vast amount of product.

Beginning at Salem the roadbed would follow the natural grade of the river, which is always the most accessible, and in this way avoid two serious objections—the one the necessity of running parallel to the S. P. lines and the other avoiding the hills and their sharp grades, etc. By following up the river and west of the range of hills it would tap a belt of country rich in hops, fruits, garden products and wood as well as stock.

A line has been surveyed and we are told, by those in a position to know, that the route is a perfectly feasible one and a glance at the possibilities in an agricultural way will convince any one.

There are between Salem and Sidney tributary to this line, on both sides of the river, something like two thousand acres of hops; these are now moved by the railroads but must be hauled for quite a distance by a wagon to the depots. This is from but a very small part of the country naturally adapted to this product so that with a road in easy reach it is but fair to say that the amount would be more than double with a easy transportation. When once an outlet for the products of this rich bottom land is made there is practically no limit to the possibilities of the supply. With ample available irrigation all the fruits, both large and small, as well as the vegetables can and will be grown and this will become the most wealthy and desirable location in the valley. We invite an inspection of these surroundings and will gladly go as one of a committee to show interested parties this route. A right of way is now available and we shall gladly welcome the approach of an electric line service.
