NOT MANY WHO KNOW

Insurance reports show a
serious increase in the number
of deaths resulting from some form

ENORMOUS YIELD OF GOLDFIELD

ENORMOUS.

A Goldfield correspondent says:
Never before has there been compiled
an authentic statement of the ton-
nage record of all mines and leases
in the Goldfield district for so long
a period as six months. The follow-
ing table, whose figures, represent-
ing tons, may be absolutely relied
upon, may therefore prove valuable
for reference in months and years to
come. It offers the scores made in
June, July, August, September, Octo-
ber and November by every property
in camp, failing to state the source
of every ton of ore only in one par-
ticular, it having been impossible in
the first three of these six months to
ascertain from just what company
workings certain Consolidated ship-
ments were mined. These three
items of ore tonnage, however, are
properly accredited to Consolidated
company account, and the single ex-
ception makes no material difference
in summing up the achievements of
the camp's several producers.

Goldfield's ore output was \$440
tons in January, 4939 in February,
2323 tons in March, 512 tons in
April and 4283 tons in May, a total
of 20,547 tons in the first five months
of the year. Add to this sum the
95,311 tons' production of the fol-
lowing six months, as shown in the
table below, and the grand total for
1907 up to the first of this month is
115,858 tons.

The average monthly production
for the eleven months of the year is
10,533 tons, and for the last six
months 15,885 tons. Every month
since last May has tallied above the
year's monthly average, and August,
October and November made marks
above the monthly average for the
last six months.

As revealed by the segregation in
the following table, the leases pro-
duced 52,196 tons, and company
workings 43,205 tons, in June, July,
August, September, October and No-
vember. The ten mines not to men-
tioned subsidiary properties and leases
operating upon them, which con-
tributed to the total of 95,311 tons in

the period are, as stated in the tabu-
lated list: Consolidated, 71,136
tons; Jumbo Extension, 14,373 tons;
Florence, 8720 tons; Combination
Fraction, 434 tons; Black Butte, 320
tons; St. Ives, 218 tons; Dal-y, 69
tons; Sandstorm, 21 tons; Velvet, 11
tons, and May Queen, 9 tons, reveal-
ing an aggregate annual rate of
190,622 tons, worth at \$100 per ton,
\$19,062,200.

Rawhide a Promising Camp.

A party of Goldfield operators,
among whom was George F. von
Polenz, made the trip to Rawhide in
an auto last week, and after spend-
ing several days inspecting the camp
returned with glowing accounts of
the showing in the new camp. Mr.
von Polenz took a number of photo-
graphs of the camp and its sur-
roundings and brought back speci-
mens that are plastered over with
gold, some of them showing nuggets
as large as a good size pea. They
found the camp very active, there
being about 1000 people in the town
living mostly in tents, though there
are several frame buildings up and
a number more in course of con-
struction. Building operations have
been hampered by the inability to
obtain lumber, but it is coming in
more freely now, and a few months
will see a substantial town built up.

There have been about 70 leases
granted in the camp, though only 18
of them are being actively worked at
the present time, owing in part to
the general money stringency. The
Colonel Proskey lease on Grutt moun-
tain, the Miller lease, west of town,
and the Kearns lease, formerly
known as the Grutt-Hardy lease, are
the three best producers to date. All
three of them are sacking ore from
the rich streaks, and have good sized
veins of milling ore opened up. The
first shipment sent out from the
Kearns lease consisted of three
sacks, weighing probably 275 pounds
in all, and the net returns were
\$1520 to the ton. These shipments
were made by the Grutt-Hardy peo-
ple, and it was on the strength of
them that Kearns and associates
purchased the lease. The shaft is
now down 49 feet and has a five-foot
vein that averages about \$120 to
the ton. There is a six-inch streak
that runs over \$300 and a small
seam that is practically solid gold.—
Goldfield News.

Transmitting Power Without Wires.

Consul John C. Covert advises that
a very important and far-reaching
invention is announced in the French
city of Lyons by which, it is said,
electrical power can be transmitted
without the use of wires, concerning
which he says:

"It may be called an extension of
the wireless use of electricity. It is
still kept a secret and it seems that
only one person in Lyons possesses
a knowledge of all the facts on the
subject. He is a prominent broker
who has financed the enterprise. He
informs me that all the work in per-
fecting the invention was carried on
in the country at the castle of a
prominent manufacturer of Lyons and
that only two persons were permitted
to know what was going on.

"Some two weeks ago the first ex-
periments were tried, and a mini-
ature streetcar was moved over a flat
space by electricity communicated
from a distance of several yards. The
invention is being tried in Marseilles
on a streetcar line and applied to
several kinds of machinery.

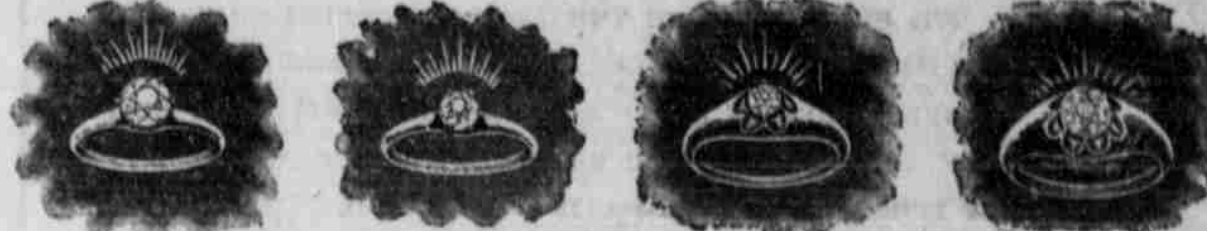
