THE U. OF O. TO CREATE A LOCAL FUND

Will Be Loaned to Assist Worthy Students to Complete College Course—\$5000 Be Raised.

The University of Oregon, Eugene, Dec. The University of Oregon is organizing a loan fund of at least \$5000, based on the belief that a loan is better than an outright gift in the hands of a scholar. Some sub-commissions have already been made to raise the entire \$5000 this year.

Almost every high school graduate in this class there are some who do not have the means for a college education, but who would take advantage of any fair opportunity offered to secure one. The treasurer of the loan fund, who is to be the school inspector and will thus have an opportunity to know personally the members of the classes, is in conjunction with the superintendents and high school principals. He will make loans to students as need them each year at a low rate of interest, with the understanding that they are to repay principal as soon as they are able to leave college. A small amount of insurance will be taken out on the plan to have ten men guarantee the fund, against loss to the amount of \$500 each.

The university has had a small fund of about \$300 for the past few years. During this time, twenty students have been enabled to complete their college course who otherwise could not have done so.

A canvass of the students of the University of Oregon just made shows that between 60 and 70 per cent of the men in the university this year are either wholly or partially supporting their own way through college.

The greater part of the earnings is done of course during the summer. The canvass shows that the vacation is comparatively short, the men get employment in the harvest fields, mills, mines and other various kinds paying good wages. It shows also that the engineering students find no trouble in finding work in their line. The engineering department has a large number of graduates in the employ of the Southern Pacific, O. R. & N., Northern Pacific, and in the government reclamation service, and the majority of the engineering students engaged before the session close in June.

A number of students are partly supporting their own way during the session. The university maintains an employment bureau under the direction of the registrar, but it has been able this fall to supply all the work made on it for students to work.

The alumni association has just presented to the University of Oregon a building of President Johnson, the president of the university. The work was done in Eugene by Mr. R. H. Goodwin, of New York, at a cost of \$500.
