Proposals Invited.

Proposals invited for supplies for Oregon state penitentiary for the year ending June 30th, 1908.

Sealed bids for drugs, dry goods, groceries, butter, leather and furs, hardware, flour, meat and wood, to be received in the office of the superintendent of the state penitentiary, until Monday, December 30th, 12 o'clock p. m., at which time they will be opened.

A deposit of \$200 in cash or certified check, payable to the superintendent, must accompany each bid. Payment and flour, and all other items must be accompanied by an amount equal to 10 per cent of the amount of the bid.

Samples to accompany all bids, where practicable. The right is reserved to reject any and all bids, and to accept or reject any portion of a bid. On each envelope should be inscribed the nature of the bid. Goods of Oregon manufacture or production will receive preference, other things being equal.

All goods and supplies must be delivered to the penitentiary within thirty days after the contract is awarded.

Wood required is 400 cords of second growth and 800 cords of second growth fir wood for delivery between the first day of May and the first day of October, 1908.

Schedules of the various lines of transportation to be bid on will be furnished

upon the application to the superintendent.

Vouchers will be issued for payment on the first of the month following the completion of the contract, and monthly on continuous contract.
