HISTORICAL SKETCH OF THE OREGON STATE LIBRARY

When Oregon was organized into a territory, in 1849, there was incorporated into the act creating the new territory an appropriation of \$5000 to be expended fo a territorial library. This sum was placed at the command of the newly appointed governor, Joseph Lane, before he left for the west, and of his appropriation some \$2000 was invested in books at that time and the remainder at a later date; the books coming around the Horn to the seat of government in Oregon City. By 1855 the library contained 1750 volumes, when misfortune overtook it in the shape of the destruction of the state house by fire on December 29, 1866; all the books, except the few which had been drawn out for use, being destroyed. Five years later the library had accumulated about 1006 volumes, principally through exchange; \$5000 having been invested in books by Governor Curry while on a visit east In 1856.


MAIN BUILDING.


