HISTORICAL SKETCH OF THE OREGON STATE LIBRARY

When Oregon was organized into a territory, in 1849, there was incorporated into the act creating the new territory an appropriation of \$5000 to be expended for a territorial library. This sum was placed at the command of the newly appointed governor, Joseph Lane, before he left for the west, and of his appropriation some \$2000 was invested in books at that time and the remainder at a later date; the books coming around the Horn to the seat of government in Oregon City.

By 1855 the library contained 1750 volumes, when misfortune overtook it in the shape of the destruction of the state house by fire on December 29, 1856; all the books, except the few which had been drawn out for use, being destroyed.

Five years later the library had accumulated about 1000 volumes, principally through exchange; \$5000 having been invested in books by Governor Curry while on a visit east in 1856.

From that time until the present, the library has steadily grown until there are now over 30,000 volumes in the library, and Oregon can boast of one of the best law libraries in the west.

Of these 30,000 volumes, about 20,000 comprise the law collection, while the remainder is composed principally of state and government

documents, which are more and more widely used by state officers, members of the legislature and students of history and economics. These documents contain a large amount of valuable material used by students for their debates.

The library has recently been catalogued, using the card system which has supplanted the old printed catalogue method in all up-to-date libraries. Under this system, as soon as a new book arrives in the library it is noted on cards which are inserted in their proper place in the catalogue so that the book does not have to depend upon the memory of the librarian until a new catalogue is printed, in order to be of service to the users of the library.

The legislature of 1907 passed a law placing the distribution of the various state documents, except the reports of the supreme court, the codes and the session laws, which are sold by the secretary of state, in the hands of the state librarian who will, by this means be able to arrange for the exchange of documents and reports of other states to much greater advantage to the library than formerly.

The state library is used, not only by the members of the supreme court, but by the bench and bar of the entire state. It is also headquarters for a large number of law students who are very fortunate to be able to avail themselves of the advantage of so large a library without cost.

The present librarian is E. N. Gillingham; the assistant librarian P. H. Raymond, and the cataloguer is Miss Edna M. Hawley.

Educational and Civic.

Nowhere on the Pacific coast can better educational advantages be had than the city of Salem affords. Besides the excellent 12-grade public school system, which is on a par with that of Portland or any other city of two or three times our size, there is Willamette University, the oldest sectarian educational institution in the Pacific northwest; the Academy of the Sacred Heart (Catholic), the Capital Business college, the Capital Normal school, and other private schools, in which a child can obtain any kind of education desired, from the ordinary literary and common school to the highest grade of professional or scientific training. None but the best class of instructors is employed, and the cost of tuition in the private schools and colleges is nominal. Willamette University possesses nearly six blocks of ground; last year a \$25,000 theological college was completed in connection, and plans are being made for the erection of a new liberal arts building and improvements to the campus and grounds generally, entailing a cost of about \$75,000.

Ever alive to the importance of first-class thoroughfares, Salem has entered upon an era of extensive street improvement, and it will not be many months until all of the streets of the city will be laid with bitulithic pavement. Provision for the permanent improvement of over five miles of streets in the northern portion of the city has been made by the city council and abutting property owners for this year.

Salem has efficient police protection, both city and county; a well organized and equipped fire department and automatic fire-alarm system; telephone and electric light systems, and over 15 miles of electric street railway, reaching to all parts of the city and the principal state institutions.
