THE BULL OBJECTED TO SWEATER

HORNLESS JERSEY TOOK OFFENSE AT HIS OWNER'S TASTE IN COLORS AND DOES A BUTTING-IN STUNT.

W. A. Collier, a rancher of Catching Inlet was in Marshfield yesterday to have himself examined and attended to after an exciting experience with a fine thoroughbred Jersey bull which he owns. Although pretty badly bruised he has no bones broken or pronounced gashes on his anatomy.

The bull has been attached to a chain and rope about one hundred feet long on Mr. Collier's farm, and after the animal had eaten all the grass he could find with the radius of the circle which he made while tied to a stake, his owner decided to lead him further afield.

Mr. Collier pulled up the stake and catching hold of the rope, which was joined to a chain fastened to a ring in the animal's nose, led the cheerful bull to a choice stretch of grass which he noticed some distance away where there was considerable water. Having reached the spot which would satisfy the inner bull, he proceeded to force the stake into the ground, and that was how the accident happened.

He was suddenly struck from behind with a violence which sent him several feet, and before he could recover himself he received another jolt. The animal was crazy mad, and when it was too late, Mr. Collier realized that he was wearing a gorgeous new red sweater, which he had just purchased in Marshfield.

The bull went after the sweater with the firm intention of demolishing it, regardless of what might be inside of it, and having been dehorned the struggle was prolonged to an amazing length, during which Mr. Collier was bunted and rolled around in the mud and water. The victim seized the chain attached to the ring in the animal's nose, but the bull did not mind any kind of twisting.

The sweater was no longer red. It had become a dark brown from the mud coating it had received. There was blood in the bull's eye, however, and the brute never noticed any difference. Fighting and struggling to gain the mastery, and being bunted with the bull's head until he was nearly overcome, Mr. Collier finally managed to secure a grip on the animal's nose and forced his nostrils into a deep pond of water.

The bull took several deep draughts of the liquid into his lungs and suddenly became pacified enough to give his owner a chance to get away from him. Mr. Collier found that no bones were broken in the mixup, but he was bruised up pretty badly. He was attended to by Dr. McCormac yesterday, who, on learning the cause of the numerous bruises he found, could not help being amused at the incident of the red sweater.

BURIED BUT WRITES A LETTER

Like a voice from the dead, a letter written by A. D. Bailey in his tomb 1,000 feet below the surface of the earth in the Alpha shaft at Ely, Nevada, has been received by Thos. Hamill, a prominent resident of Victor, Colo. Though imprisoned with two companions back of a solid mass of rock and dirt and in imminent danger of being crushed to death at any moment, Bailey is none the less happy. His letter bespeaks every hope and says that probably he will be on earth again in another week or so. The letter follows:

"Mr. Thos. Hamill, Victor, Colo.

"Dear Sir and Brother Elk. I suppose you will be surprised to receive this letter and I am a lucky man or I would not be able to write you."

"At present writing I am imprisoned in the Alpha shaft. I was running a pump here and on the 4th of this month the shaft caved in and there were four men down in the shaft sinking for the next level. Two of the men are here in the pump station with me and the other two are buried at the bottom of the shaft."

Shut in by the Earth.

"The shaft caved in at the 400-foot level and we are at the 1000-foot level. The shaft is full of dirt up to the cave-in. But they have secured the bad ground and are going to start mucking out the shaft tomorrow morning. If all goes well, I hope to be on top in from 12 to 14 days. We have been down the mine since 7 a. m. December 4."

"Ten minutes from the time the cave-in started the shaft was filled above this level and it is 90 feet from this level to the bottom of the shaft, so that will give you an idea what a bad cave-in it was. We had a telephone connected and the last message I sent up over the small wire was to shut off steam, and just then those wires broke."

Live on Fat of Land.

"There are 500 feet of the shaft above us, filled with solid rock. After the accident we disconnected the six-inch water column with the pump and they are sending our drinking water and rations down the six-inch pipe."

"We are living on the best in the land, as everybody wants to send us something. Wine, cigars and all kinds of fruits are being sent down. They send down our supplies on a rope and the small vessels they send our stuff in are made of two-inch nipples about four inches long, with a cap screwed on and the small eyebolt screwed in the cap and a flexible link between the separate vessels, so that we can get them to come through the bottom of the water column. There are four vessels per trip. After we get the water column open we connected our phone to the electric cable and we can telephone up and talk to the men on top at any time."

Hopeful, Though Buried.

"Well, brother, if all is well and all-wise providence stays with us, I hope in a short time to be on top and see my wife and family. We are above the water level and there is no danger on that score. We have in charge of the shaft one of the best shaft men in the country, a big Elk by the name of John Gallagher."
