JAPANESE FIGHT LIKE DEMONS

FOUR MEN KILLED

REMARKABLY BLOODY FIGHT IN THE STREETS OF A BRITISH COLUMBIA CITY—ALL BECAUSE A MAN SMASHED A WINDOW BY ACCIDENT.

Vancouver, B. C., Jan. 2.—Three city firemen, Frost, Anderson and McDonald, were set upon by a mob of knife-armed Japanese early this morning and left for dead at the corner of Powell street and Gore Ave., two blocks from the city police station. The men were clothed in distinctive uniform, with brass buttons. By accident, Frost fell against a window of a Japanese store and smashed the plate glass. In an instant the Japanese proprietor rushed out. Many of his countrymen immediately came to join in the fight, for it was in the center of the Japanese district that the incident occurred. The firemen are athletic young men, but they were overpowered after a fight, when the flesh on their faces had been torn into ribbons by the razor-like knives the Orientals carried. Frost is probably mortally wounded, for his neck was cut and slashed and laid open for four inches and two inches deep alongside the jugular vein. The men were frightfully mangled about the arms and bodies, but McDonald and Anderson were still fighting over the body of Frost when a squad of police arrived. Four Japanese were arrested, and the three firemen were taken to the hospital. The Japanese fought like demons, and some of the knives they carried were over a foot long.

PETTIBONE CASE NOT DECIDED

MAY GO TO JURY

VERDICT IN HAYWOOD CASE MAKES IT IMPOSSIBLE TO SECURE CONVICTION IN THIS INSTANCE—ARGUMENTS TO THE JURY FRIDAY.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Boise, Idaho, Jan. 2.—Further requests for instructions were presented by both sides in the Pettibone case today, requiring an adjournment until tomorrow in order that the authorities on them might be examined by Judge Wood. The defense asked that the jury be instructed that the verdict of not guilty in the Haywood case made it impossible to return a verdict of guilty in this case, if the evidence shows that Haywood and Pettibone were parties to the same conspiracy, if any existed. The state requested an instruction to the effect that if the defendant had in his possession facts not testified to either by himself or otherwise, this fact might be considered by the jury. The prosecution has decided to present arguments in the case, and James H. Hawley, chief counsel for the state, will make the first address to the jury. It is not the present plan of the defense, Judge Hillton said, to argue the case at all, but should this plan be changed, Senator Borah will close for the state. Judge Wood announced that he desired that the case go to the jury this week, and night sessions will be held if necessary.

A large crowd gathered in the court room this morning expecting to see an end of the trial. Pettibone appeared very weak, but stated that he was slowly improving. He was returned to the hospital after court adjourned.

FULTON DECLARES FOR TAFT

HAS BEEN A SUCCESS

OREGON SENATOR SAYS THE SECRETARY OF WAR IS THE MOST AVAILABLE MAN WHO HAS YET BEEN PRESENTED TO THE PEOPLE FOR THE OFFICE OF PRESIDENT.

Portland, Or., Jan. 2.—"I do not think there is any doubt that Oregon will send a solid Taft delegation to the Republican national convention," declares Senator Fulton. "Believing as I do that Secretary Taft is the strongest and most available man that has been named for the presidential nomination, I shall do what I can to insure sending from this state delegates to the nominating convention who will support his candidacy. "I consider that Secretary Taft would prove the most able exponent of the principles the people desire to see carried out. Besides, he is unquestionably the strongest and most available candidate that has been suggested among the Republicans. He has been tried in various phases of statesmanship, and in every instance he has proved entirely capable in the judiciary, in the administration of the government's policies at home and abroad and in his conduct of the office he now holds, he has been a success."

INDIANA TRACTION COMPANY

MOB OF THREE THOUSAND TERRORIZE A CITY—ARMED FORCE REQUIRED TO PREVENT DESTRUCTION OF CAR BARN—NUMBER OF CARS WRECKED

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Muncie, Ind., Jan. 2.—With the entire police force apparently cowed, the county authorities helpless, and the city in the hands of a wild mob of 3000 sympathizers of the striking car men on the local lines of the Indiana Traction Company, renewed appeals are being telegraphed today to Governor Hanley to rush a regiment of the national guard into the city. Attempt after attempt was made by the company to force its cars through the lines of the strikers, but the withering reception of stones and bricks that each car received drove the crews back in distress, their cars often being almost total wrecks. At noon today the mob marched to the car barns, which have been converted into temporary barracks for the reception and protection of the strike-breakers, and for a time it was feared that the big, barn-like structures would be burned. Desperate and determined to protect their property and the lives of their employes at all costs, and placing no reliance upon the municipal and county authorities, the traction company armed 100 of the strike-breakers with rifles and placed them at vantage points about the building. When the mob came in view of the barns they were greeted with the sight of the armed men, each carrying a rifle at an ominous angle and full cartridge belts hung over their shoulders. The display of force caused the mob to halt, and after a few futile volleys of stones the mob dropped back sullenly enough, to await developments. Apparently the sympathizers lack a strong leader. Two cars on the interurban line were wrecked today, because they were being operated by strike-breakers.

FINZER GOES EAST

TO CONSULT ON WAR

INFANTRY ORGANIZATIONS MAY BE MOBILIZED ON THE PACIFIC COAST FOR A DEFENSIVE CAMPAIGN—NEW TROOPS TO BE RECRUITED.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Portland, Or., Jan. 2.—Adjutant-generals of the three Pacific coast states—Oregon, Washington and California—have been invited by the war department to go to Washington, D. C., for a conference at the earliest possible date on the subject of coast defense. Adjutant-General W. E. Finzer, of Oregon, and General J. B. Lauck, of California, are leaving for the capital tomorrow, while General Otis Hamilton, of Washington, will start East Saturday.

The request from the war department for this conference is regarded as peculiarly significant, indicating the government's determination to prepare for any emergencies that may arise from the West. The principal topic of consideration at the conference will be that of training volunteer coast artillery reserves to man Oregon, Washington and California fortifications. The subject of perfecting the infantry regiments of the three states in coast defense operations will likewise be taken up. It is assured that the meeting will result in assignment of national guard troops to coast artillery work. The three adjutant-generals will very likely return with the task ahead of recruiting new coast companies for this service.

DOYEN'S SALOON CLOSED.

Mayor Rodgers Refuses to Sign New Liquor License and the Establishment Not Allowed to Open—Said to Have Been Run in a Disorderly Manner.

Mayor Rodgers refused to sign the license of the J. Doyens saloon, which was granted recently by the council, and, as a result the establishment was not allowed to open this morning, and the proprietor was notified to vacate within ten days. It is claimed that the place has been run very disorderly for some time past, and that the management of the house has disregarded the warning given by the authorities. The license expired on December 31, and the mayor decided to not grant a new privilege. Mr. Doyens is reported to be making arrangements to move his stock to Woodburn. It is understood that Salem saloonmen generally approve of the mayor's action in cancelling Doyens' license.
