CALLED TO UNLOAD THEIR TALK

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Olympia, Wash., Jan. 3.—Adjutant-General Otis Hamilton, of the Washington National Guard, says the summoning of the adjutant-generals of Oregon, Washington and California to Washington, D. C., is solely to confer with the war department as to maneuver camps this year, and the organization of coast artillery reserves, and that the suggestion for the conference originated with state and not with federal authorities. General Hamilton said:
"The report coming from Portland to the effect that the adjutant-generals of the three Pacific coast states had been summoned to Washington for a conference with the war department officials need cause nobody any concern. The conditions which brought about this proposed conference are purely local in the Pacific coast states, and pertain wholly to the administration of national guard affairs therein."

Attell says he will fight, but it must be at 120 pounds two and a half hours before the gong sounds. Moran says this is impossible, and that the best he will do is 122 four hours before the contest.

MAFAZINE ARTICLES ON SLUSH

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Portland, Or., Jan. 3.—"The States navy is all right," said Rear-Admiral William T. Burwell, commandant of the Puget Sound navy yards, and for two years commander of the battleship Oregon, yesterday. "That article in the January McClure's magazine is correct enough as far as it goes, but it does not go far enough, hence conveys a wrong impression. He does not mention the good points our ships have."
"Here is the matter in a nutshell. A ship can carry just so much load, say 15,000 tons. This includes, of course, its own weight. Now the gun man wants 15,000 tons of guns on board, the engineer wants 15,000 tons of engines and coal, and the armor man wants 15,000 tons of armor. Clearly then a battleship is a compromise between all those requirements. If you raise the sides as high as those of the Dakota you, of course, have splendid seagoing qualities, and a high place from which to fire your guns, but look at the target you offer the other fellow's guns. And, of course, these high sides cannot be of as heavy armor as the low sides. As for what he says about the sides of our ships being too low, I will say that for two years I commanded the Oregon, the lowest vessel of her class in the world; and in all that time, except once, I could have fired every gun on board in all kinds of weather."
